Egypt's Bernard Pascal \& Hany Dagher had a storming third session with nearly 70\% and so overtook the longtime leaders fellow Egyptians Mahmoud Zaitoun \& Karim Azmy. In third spot South Africans Neville Eber \& Hennie Fick. The other pair winning a cash prize are Rob Stephens \& Nicola Bateman. Tomorrow’s bulletin will contain a blow by blow account of the final rounds showing all the twists and turns and changes of position.

Tomorrow we start the teams events,Team Championships. They start with Round Robin matches before fi nals are played to determine the African Champions.

## All Africa Pairs - A Report on the Second Session

The second of three sessions of the All Africa Pairs Championships started at 10.00 GMT with 23 pairs all eager to start the day well. Thy eased in with the first board being a slam that was not difficult to bid. It is a hand that illustrates the vagaries of a Pairs event. Look at the hand below and ask yourself what would you expect your matchpoint score to be after bidding and making Six Diamonds on the nose. Today the answer was a big fat zero-yes no matchpoints. Have some compassion for Narguis \& Giraud who bid to the excellent slam and played it well.

Three pairs played in diamonds, and the same number in hearts and the remaining five chose no-trumps. One of the heart bidders stretched to the grand slam level, but with both red queens obliging it duly rolled home, all the matchpoints to Sorensen \& Apteker.

Auctions along these lines appeared at eight tables. Only one declarer made the contract after a spade lead. The defence cashed their four spade tricks and South switched to the J. Declarer reading the cards nicely rose with the ace to fell the singleton king and now tabled the $\vee 9$, when North covered declarer was getting close. A subsequent successful finesse against the $\downarrow$ Q allowed another heart finesse to bring declarer's tally to nine. Very well played by Craig. In bulletin-speak a hand like this known as a 'Rabbinical' hand as there was a famous rabbi in the USA who frequently felled a singleton king of clubs offside.

Maybe Rabbis like London buses turn up in pairs another singleton king of clubs offside - will anyone drop it? It was not difficult as nine times North was declarer so the bare king was obvious to all. On one occasion East played in $4 \boldsymbol{e}$ but was doubled and, yes, the king of clubs was felled by declarer but doubled vulnerable undertricks meant the score was zero, but a mention to Chelbi Emna for dropping the offside king.

Five pairs arrived in the hopeless 3NT contracteight tricks - no more no less. Two reached the optimum contract of Five Diamonds and both failed. How you may ask? Well it appears they did not deem it worthy of making a small safety play. Each declarer led a small diamond towards the ace and then played it, all that was needed was to cover East's card and you are guaranteed to only lose one trick in the suit. Playing the ace only gains when West has the singleton king.

The majority of pairs ended up in Four Spades and at every table North led the ace of clubs. He now has twelve cards in his hand and eleven of them will see the defeat of the contract and one will let the contract through. Yes every defender carried on regardless with the king of clubs presenting declarer with an unmakeable contract. When declarer followed with the 2 on the first round your partner does have an even number of cards, unless it is a doubleton honour. It seems to me the only time it is right to continue with the king is when partner has three to the queen. The inherent risks of playing the king seem too great to me.

When West opened 2NT showing 20-21(2) and an invitation was made to bid slam it was declined. Some had other weapons at their disposal in responding to an opening 2 NT - always one of the most difficult bids to make accurate continuations, The secret it seems is not to open 2NT

After the artificial One Club it was easy to find the diamond fit and reach the excellent slam. 6NT is also a good spot found by two pairs but $6 \downarrow$ was worth a healthy $75 \%$ of the available matchpoints.

Board 15 was remarkable as everyone made Four Spades plus two. And then Board 16 was al;so remarkable in that at every table Nort/South played in some number of hearts when East/West were cold for Four Spades.

On nine occasions North was not going to be denied is spade suit and generally made eleven tricks. At this table the auction took a different turn. South's 3\% was alerted as Michaels but not as I know it, whatever it may have or should have meant the outcome was the only slam which had a chance. In fact as the cards lay only the lead of the king of hearts followed by a diamond defeat this improbable contract.

This was the basis of many auctions. After the lead of ace and another club, declarer drew trumps took a losing heart finesse and then tackled diamonds. At the next occasion in dummy a second losing heart finesse was taken and I heard many declarers blaming their bad luck for the contract failing. Yes you might presume that South had something for his call but why not bend the odds in your favour. My plan would have been to draw trumps and then tackle the diamonds but rather than cashing the fourth round I would ruff it in dummy and then play a heart to the queen, expecting it to win. However if it does win then if South started with a seven-card club suit what will North do if he produces the king of hearts - he will have no choice but to return a heart disembarrassing you of your losing heart.

The second session saw the overnight leaders, Mahmoud Zaitoun \& Karim Azmy, consolidate their position at the top of the leaderboard. Diana Rosslee \& Craig Gower had moved up from sixth place to second to be challenging the leaders. Diana Balkin \& Sharoin Izerel leapt from twelfth spot to be in third position. The final session of the afternoon promised to be tough affair.

## Play Links

Each category will have its own playing link ( Open teams link-Women teams link .. etc. Play links will be posted to the captains' WhatsApp group and will be also posted to the ABF website at the following link
 https://www.bridgewebs.com/cgi-bin/bwop/bw.cgi?club=abf\&pid=display page24 Click the Match number, official start time or Session open time of your category to join the game. The game will be open to players 30 min before the official start time.

## 1. Open, Women \& Mixed Categories.

For the Semi-final, Final and play-off sessions, It has been decided that:

- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 2 and 4 in the Semifinal match.
- The team ranked lower after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 1 and 3 in the SemiFinal match.
- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in session 2 in the Final or Play-off match.
- If Morocco team qualify to the final match in any category, there will be a 4 Segments play-off match between the semi-final losers to determine the team to qualify to Marrakesh.


## 2. All Africa Pairs tie-break procedure

If two pairs or more have the same cumulative score after the end of the 2 nd session or 4th Session, the tie shall be broken as follows:
A. The pair with the higher score in the $2 \mathrm{nd} / 4$ th session shall determine the final ranking.
B. Mutual boards between the tied pairs - if applicable -

The last Round Robin for all categories shall be done according to the final ranking of the teams in the previous played rounds.

## 9. Home \& Visiting teams

## 10. Headphones / Earphones

In order to minimize the noise in the venue as much as possible...

- It is mandatory for each player to have his own headphone / earphone which is connected to his device during play
- Use the table chat / private chat as much as possible and don't use vocal chat.
- Any vocal explanation will not be taken into the TD consideration in any case.
- You need to be very careful when using the table chat as you might give an unauthorized information to your partner which could results in adjusted score by the TD.


## 11. Kibitzers

- Kibitzers are not allowed by any means at 1) the playing venue, 2) RealBridge online playing room.
- All players are required to immediately leave the playing area when they finish their session, players are also kindly asked to keep their seats and not roam around the playing area.

- Talking loudly during or at the end of any board if the player is unhappy about his/her partner's bid, hand play or defense.

# RealBridge Playing Instructions 

## First : Log in , Lobby, at the table and Settings

1. To join any RealBridge game you will need a LINK
2. All the play links will be available on ABF website https://www.bridgewebs.com/cgi-bin/bwop/bw.cgi?club=abf\&pid=display page24 AND you might also receive it by mail. 3. Click the link and you will be redirected to the log on page of our game which looks like the next figure ... Notice that your video should appear in the right bottom corner of the page and mic volume showing that it works.
3. If you can't see your video then you need to allow your browser to use your cam and mic, do as follows to allow it

4. From Goggle Chrome and just before the address bar, press the lock icon
5. Allow cam and allow mic.
6. Write your name in the required field and press login - nothing else is to be done- NO ID number will be used, ( leave it blank)
7. When you logged in you will see the lobby which almost looks like the following figure ( but this figure includes extra buttons for TDs

## Second : Bidding, Play, Alert and System

13. At the start of any session, All the team members are required to be seated at the same table ( Table with the team name label ), the system will automatically move the EW pairs to the opponents table when we start the session and will send them back to their home table when both tables finish playing the boards.

## 14. Private chat and Table chat

- It is strongly recommended to use the chat rather than the vocal chat; the TDs will not take into consideration any vocal explanation if you have any case.
- I will show you now, 2 figures and will appoint to you where to find the table chat (where the 4 players can see your chat) and where to find the private chat where you can chat privately with one of your opponents ( not your partner of-course © ).

17. Write / Put in explanation
18. Make bid


If you make a mistake or need to explain your bid further after you have bid, you can click on the bid and
 add more text.

The added text will appear after an asterisk *. The time in seconds between when the bid was made and the added explanation was submitted is presented after the added text in the square brackets, for this example, 26 seconds. The character limit on explanations is 200 characters.
