## $12^{\text {th }}$ African Bridge Championships

## Halfway Point in Round Robins for Open and Women Passed

Congratulations to both South African Teams who not only won all three matches today, but are heading the rankings as well.

In the Open Championships with $60 \%$ of the Roun Robin matches played, South Africa have opened up daylight of 17 VPs between themselves and Egypt who are 8 VPs ahead of Tunisia. Then there is a gulf to the fourth place but Morocco and Reunion are having a tussle for that all important spot to give them the chance of going to Marrakesh.

In the Women Championship it is much tighter at the top with South Africa 3 VPs ahead of Egypt and Tunisia only 3 VPs behind. Morocco are a distant fourth. The first match today could have significant bearing on the result as it pits the top two against each other. That may well be match to watch.

Players are reminded of the rules surrounding an 'Undo' of a bid.
The relevant Law 25 is printed in full at the end of this bulletin.

South cashed the ace of clubs, North playing the jack, before switching to a heart to the queen, king and ace. Declarer took two rounds of trumps exposing the 3-1 split and led a club towards dummy whereupon South rose with the king, South cashed the good trump and played another club. Declarer rose with the queen and was rewarded with the sight of the 10 falling leaving the 9 master and so both losing diamonds went away, allowing the contract to make.

3NT was alerted but no explanation given, I assume it was a four-card support, game going. South led the ace of clubs but this time switched to a diamond, taken in dummy with the ace. Two rounds of trumps followed and now declarer crossed to dummy with a diamond and led the queen of hearts which held the trick. A second heart was taken with the ace and then a club towards dummy, but South rose with the king, cashed the master trump and then the jack of diamonds for one down. 10 IMPs to Reunion.

West led the $\vee 7$ to the queen and ace. A diamond to dummy's ace saw the $\vee 8$ run round to West's $\uparrow 10$. West played ace and another trump taken in hand with the 10 . The 9 was covered by the king and ruffed in dummy. Declarer cashed the queen of trumps and came to hand with the ace of spades and drew the outstanding trump and cashed the established jack of hearts for her contract

Two Spades was alerted as 'c raise' which I have failed to decipher. The lead of the 4 was covered by the 5 and North played his 7 and must have been pleasantly surprised when it held the trick.. He returned a spade which South took with the ace and continued the suit, dummy's queen taking the trick. .A diamond to the king and a diamond back to the queen was allowed to hold. North took the third round and played a spade, whereupon declarer swiftly cashed the four winners in dummy coming down to doubleton king of hearts and the ace of clubs and so was able to establish a heart trick to go with the ace of clubs and come to a slightly improbable nine tricks. 13 IMPs to South Africa.

Having a non-forcing Stayman available South was able to not only probably find a better contract but also more likely to inhibit the opposition entering the auction. The play is not the thing on this hand and declarer peacefully drifted three off but was not afraid of a bad result.

A little pushy in the bidding but we all have been guilty of that before. West led a spade taken in hand and trumps were immediately tackled with East ducking the queen. The singleton diamond from dummy was taken by East's ace. East now played ace and another trump taken in hand.. Declarer's $\$$ was covered by the king and won in dummy with the ace. A small club saw the 10 in hand take the trick. Declarer was down to her last resort and played king another diamond intending to run it if not covered but West played the queen and now declarer had ten tricks and the same number of IMPs to Reunion.

At the end of the match South Africa emerged winners by 13.52-6.48 VPs.

The first board in this session had a remarkable result in one room.

Names are withheld to protect the guilty. North led the $\uparrow 10$, ducked and then the $₫$, again ducked while discarding a heart and a diamond. South now switched to the $\vee 10$, ducked and the declarer took the next heart with the ace. The 10 from hand saw no cover from North and so dummy's ace was played. Declarer cashed ace of spades before taking a losing club finesse and so giving the defence the rest of the tricks. Seven off, -1700, I think that is a record so far - if you know different please let me know.
Vanessa Armstrong of South Africa played in3NT on the same board as West, see if you can see a difference in the results. North led the king of hearts which was ducked and a small heart continuationwas taken by declarer’s $\vee$ J. A small club to dummy's $\mathbf{j}$ held the trick and a diamond played towards hand saw the queen hold the trick.. A club to dummy's ace and when the suit broke kindly she had nine tricks. A difference of six tricks on the same hand, I think that is another record, unless of course you know better.

South led a heart to the queen and ace. A small heart was ruffed and a losing trump finesse was taken. South now cashed the ace of clubs before continuing the suit for North to take the king and jack. With a trump trick still to come declarer was one off.

Declarer took two top trumps and four honours in the red suits, discarding a club from dummy and conceded two clubs and a trump but still had ten tricks and the same number of IMPs to Egypt.

I feel South might perhaps have made a bid over $2 \star$, after all you hold the balance of points. The ace of hearts was followed by a slightly deceiving queen of spades taken by declarer's ace. Trumps were drawn in two rounds and declarer led toward the $₹ \mathrm{~J}$ and South rose unnecessarily with the king. The ace of clubs was taken and another led for North to win and rather than lead a spade, believing perhaps Declarer had the king tried another club giving a ruff and discard. The $\vee 8$ from dummy was ruffed, felling the $\geqslant \mathrm{J}$ and so an improbable overtrick was made. 11 IMPs to Egypt.

I fail to understand South's Doubles. South was lucky to escape with no overtricks. After the lead of a diamond, declarer took two rounds of trumps staying hand and lead a heart to the queen. A club from dummy saw North take his ace and play another which declarer ruffed. Declarer crossed to the ace of hearts and attempted to come to hand with a diamond but Sout ruffed and cashed the king of hearts to hold declarer to ten tricks.

After East had passed she called the TD to ask for an 'undo'. The TD did not allow the undo citing part of Law 25 (CHANGE OF CALL). "The TDs allow undo for an obvious miss-click which is the unintended call in the Law book, but they don't allow the change of call when it might be based on a change of mind or lost of concentration or confusion". The full text of Law 25 is published at the end of this bulletin along with a simplified version and a comment from your Head TD. E ast's heart lead was taken by West who played back a spade which gave declarer the chance to run her seven tricks but no more and so one light.

With her minimum West was not going to accept any invitations. South's 2 was taken by North's king. After getting the news about the heart break after cashing two rounds (South discarding a diamond) declarer cashed four rounds of diamonds and played a spade to South's ace and played a club to North's queen who then cashed his three
winning hearts. South, perhaps taking a momentray nap kept the wrong card for the thirteenth trick and so declarer's scored the last trick and so made the contract

At the end of the match Egypt had outscored Kenya 15.56-4.44 VPs.

The two of diamonds was led and taken by North's queen. The suit was returned to $\downarrow 9, \star 10$ and jack. Declarer now cashed the ace of hearts and played a small spade to the queen, North taking his ace and returning the suit. Now to throw in South with the diamonds he had to use his hearts as transport and now there was no squeeze against North. It is very difficult to see but if at trick four instead of playing a small spade the king is led and taken by the ace then a squeeze develops against North after South is thrown in with a diamond and forced to return into the club tenace. If North ducks the king of spades then he is thrown in with a heart and South gets squeezed in the minors - if you have a spare five minutes it is rewarding playing it out through all its variations.

South led a heart and winning in hand declarer cashed three rounds of trumps and then two more rounds of hearts and when North did not ruff in a fourth round of hearts was played and the losing club went away so declarer actually made twelve tricks but 11 IMPs to Tunisia.

It was a bruising experience for Egypt as Tunisia had won by 19.69-0.31 VPs. Egypt will have days where fortune will favour them.

## LAW 25 - LEGAL AND ILLEGAL CHANGES OF CALL

## A. Unintended Call

1. If a player discovers that he has not made the call he intended to make, he may, until his partner makes a call, substitute the call e intended for the unintended call. The second (intended) call stands and is subject to the appropriate Law, but the lead restrictions in Law 26 do not apply.
2. If the player's original intent was to make the call selected or voiced, that call stands. A change of call may be allowed because of a mechanical error or a slip of the tongue, but not because of a loss of concentration regarding the intent of the action.
3. A player is allowed to replace an unintended call if the conditions described in A1 above are met, no matter how he may have become aware of his error.
4. No substitution of call may be made when his partner has made a subsequent call.
5. If the auction ends before it reaches the player's partner no substitution may occur after the end of the auction period (see Law 17D).
6. If a substitution is allowed the LHO may withdraw any call he made over the first call. Information from the withdrawn call is authorized to his side and unauthorized to the opponents.
B. Call Intended
7. A substituted call not permitted by A may be accepted by the offender's LHO. (It is accepted if LHO calls intentionally over it.) The first call is then withdrawn, the second call stands and the auction continues (Law 26 may apply).
8. Except as in B1, a substitution not permitted by A is cancelled. The original call stands and the auction continues (Law 26 may apply).
9. Law 16C applies to any call withdrawn or cancelled.

## LAW 25 - Simplified Version

## Bridge Laws simplified by David Stevenson (we called it Yellow book ) English Bridge Union

CHANGE OF CALL [LAW 25]
(A) A slip of the tongue, or the wrong card taken from the box using Bidding Boxes, may be changed (so long as Partner has not called subsequently, nor the opening lead faced). Once theplayer notices his mistake (however he becomes aware of it) then he may change his call and the second call is legal (LHO may withdraw without penalty any call he made after the first call) and the bidding continues normally without penalty.
(B) If it was a change of mind or he lost concentration and made the call he intended despite it not being correct in general terms, then the call may not be changed. If he does change it in this case then the next player may accept the change, otherwise it reverts to the original call and there may be Lead Penalties.

Here is an example of Law 25 and it was written to the European Bridge League lectures to the TDs. Unintended call: without ever having had the intention to make that call. Some say: a mechanical error, meaning that thinking had nothing to do with it.
A pass after a splinter from partner most probably is not an unintended call. The player was thinking of making an effort to go to slam and decided not to do so, but he forgot that even game wasn't reached yet. This Pass should be stand and the TD should not allow the change, because it is simply a loss concentration and not an unintended call.

TD decisions regarding these irregularities are not easy to make. How to know what this brain of somebody else did think of? Whether he lost concentration or not? Whether he was confused or not? It is a Worldwide standard for any good TD that, the TD has to be very severe, only if he is sure byond any small doubts and it was clear that the call was really unintended, he can allow the change.
