## $12^{\text {th }}$ African Bridge Championships

## The Finals to Decide Champions of Africa

In Open Championship semi-fimals South Africa blasted past Morocco who conceded after two sessions. For those two sessions South Africa played brilliantly and whoever had been their opponents would have struggled to keep up with them. In the other semi-final between Egypt and Tunisia, it was Egypt who won all three sessions by 23, 20 and 27 respectively, giving them a healthy lead into the final session. The winner of this semi-final will accompany South Africa to Marrakesh.

In the Womens Championship South Africa had the better of Tunisia, winning all three meetings by 31,35 and 6 giving them a lead of 72 . It will be hard work for Tunisia to overturn that score. The Moroccan Women took the first two sessions against Egtpt to build a healthy lead of 44 but Egypt came back in the last session of the day and clawed back 23 to leave them only 21 behind. Tomorrow's final session will be a hard fought affair.

The final session of the semi-finals start at 9.00 GMT.
The Open Championship final will be between South Africa and the winner of the other semi-final and will be over two sessions starting at 12.30 . For the two losing semi-finalists there will be a play-off at the same time as the final.

The Women Championship final will be between the two winners of the semi-final. The two teams goimg to Marrakesh will be the two finalists unless one of them is Morocco, in which case the two losing semi-finalists will play-off for the right to go to the World Championships over four sessions.

## Open Championship Day 5 Session 3 Reunion v Morocco

The very last match in the Open Championships Round Robin series had Reunion pitted against Morocco. At the beginning of the day Reunion were 20 VPs adrift of Morocco and that vital fourth place in the table. Having had the better results from the first two rounds Reunion now needed to win with 13 VPs to progress to the semi-finals.

Would 3 by West over East's $2 \uparrow$ have described his hand, especially as he had passed originally and if so would it have got them to the slam. As there was virtually no way to play the trump suit for two losers declarer had twelve ticks.

When West elected to open his hand it became easier for East to go on to slam when West was prepared to bid at the five-level. Same twelve tricks and 13 IMPs to Reunion.

South started with the king of spades which held the trick. The spade continuation was won by North who switched to his singleton club. When trumps were played South immediately took his ace and played a club for partner to ruff and defeat the contract.

North led his singleton club taken in hand by declarer and a trump was played, South winning with the ace and giving partner a club ruff. North cashed the ace of spades, South playing the $\$ 4$ and now North switched to a diamond. Declarer now had his contract as he could discard his losing spade on the king of diamonds. I do not know $\mathrm{N} / \mathrm{S}$ carding methods in this situation but South needed to encourage a spade continuation, perhaps he thought he had already sent that message when he returned the 10 for partner to ruff, an obvious suit signal. 10 IMPs to Reunion.

Viewing his hand through rose-tinted spectacles East blasted into slam. Not the best odds, after a club lead it is about $25 \%$ - you need a 3-3 spade split and the diamonds to come in for one loser. Today was the right day for putting on those spectacles as all the requirements mentioned above fell into place.

The Three Clubs relay bid was not fully explained, I think the 3NT response showed the strong hand and not the $5-5$ variant. There was little East could now do except pass. On the heart lead declarer rapidly made twelve tricks but it was 12 IMPs to Morocco.

Reunion won the match but only by 12.29-7.71 VPs which left them three-quarters of a victory point short of qualifying for the semi-finals. Bad luck.

The first match of the semi-final between Egypt and Tunisia started the penultimate day of the Championships.

I wonder if North had a little doze and forgot that 3NT showed a spade fit. The $\vee 7$ went to East's jack and declarer's ace. A spade to dummy's queen and the ten of clubs run round to the king. West now cashed the king and queen of hearts before exiting with a diamond taken with dummy's ace. Declarer now had nine tricks.

The more likely contract of $4 \boldsymbol{\Phi}$ was reached and East led the $\mathrm{VJ}^{2}$ taken by dummy's ace. A spade to the queen and one back to the king brought to light the trump situation. Declarer continued with a third
round of trumps and taking the club finesse which West smoothly ducked. When declarer repeated the finesse West took his king, cashed the king of hearts and then the queen, ruffed and overruffed. The defence then came to two diamond tricks so the contract was two off. 13 IMPs to Egypt.

Always good to bid a minor-suit slam, though the heart slam is basically the same odds. The question is how good are the odds for the grand slam. The a priori odds are about $52 \%$ in favour of playing for the drop. However at this table you know North has (probably) six spades and South only three. This changes the vacant spaces arguments significantly and I believe that the odds have swung in favour taking a second round finesse against the queen in the South hand by about 4\%

West bid the grand slam knowing he was missing the queen of trumps. It is well known that the normal lead against a grand slam is a trump. If that is the case then it settles the suit for declarer and if as here a trump is not led there is a negative inference that the hand on lead has the missing queen. There was no diamond lead and declarer played the top trumps and was shortly claiming his grand slam and 13 IMPs to Egypt.

## Women Championship Semi-Final Session 2 South Africa v Tunisia

In the Women Champion ship after the first session South Africa held a good lead over Tunisia 60-29 IMPs. Tunisia would need to fight back strongly to keep themselves in the semi-final.


Declarer ruffed the opening diamond lead and ran the jack of hearts, ducked by East. A heart to the ace and ace of clubs unblocked. East took the queen of hearts and played another diamond. Declare ruffed, drew the last trump and cashed four clubs conceding last two tricks after he had scored ten.

I was continually surprised on this hand, firstly West did not act over the opening $1 \diamond$ and then when she learnt partner had a hand with at least four hearts, values and at most a singleton spade could only squeak out $2 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$. You have no losers in spades or diamonds, at least a 6-4 fit in hearts, what more do you need to make some kind of effort. Six hearts can be made on careful play. In theory $3>$ can be beaten but requires some counter intuitive defence.

Four Diamonds seems a big gamble to me. If you are desperate to compete then try a double. The problem with Four Diamonds is that partner probably has a reasonable hand and will bid on, suspecting you of holding a hand worth bidding on rather than the eight-loser you actually hold. East started with his singleton heart taken in dummy. The queen of diamonds was taken by West's ace and a heart was ruffed by East. The queen of spades was covered by the king and ace and another heart ruffed with the king of diamonds. Declarer ruffed the spade continuation in hand and cashed the jack of diamonds. The defence now had a trump and a club trick to come for four off and 11 IMPs to South Africa

How best to bid the South hand ,don't ask me I don't know. 3NT was practical and avoided any possible pratfalls and got a vulnerable game on the scoresheet.

Click the Match number, official start time or Session open time of your category to join the game. The game will be open to players 30 min before the official start time.

## 1. Open, Women \& Mixed Categories.

For the Semi-final, Final and play-off sessions, It has been decided that:

- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 2 and 4 in the Semifinal match.
- The team ranked lower after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 1 and 3 in the SemiFinal match.
- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in session 2 in the Final or Play-off match.
- If Morocco team qualify to the final match in any category, there will be a 4 Segments play-off match between the semi-final losers to determine the team to qualify to Marrakesh.


## 2. All Africa Pairs tie-break procedure

If two pairs or more have the same cumulative score after the end of the 2 nd session or 4th Session, the tie shall be broken as follows:
A. The pair with the higher score in the $2 \mathrm{nd} / 4$ th session shall determine the final ranking.
B. Mutual boards between the tied pairs - if applicable -

- NO LINE-UP will be needed from the teams, the visiting team has to sit first at their table (in Pairs NS and EW ), minimum 10 min before the official start time, and the Home team has the right to have a look at the visiting team and sit its pairs accordingly.


## 10. Headphones / Earphones

In order to minimize the noise in the venue as much as possible...

- It is mandatory for each player to have his own headphone / earphone which is connected to his device during play
- Use the table chat / private chat as much as possible and don't use vocal chat.
- Any vocal explanation will not be taken into the TD consideration in any case.
- You need to be very careful when using the table chat as you might give an unauthorized information to your partner which could results in adjusted score by the TD.


## 11. Kibitzers

- Kibitzers are not allowed by any means at 1) the playing venue, 2) RealBridge online playing room.
- All players are required to immediately leave the playing area when they finish their session, players are also kindly asked to keep their seats and not roam around the playing area.

- Eating (even if only biscuits)
- Drinking Alcohol
- Smoking
- Going to the WC without permission
- Talking loudly during or at the end of any board if the player is unhappy about his/her partner's bid, hand play or defense.

## First : Log in, Lobby, at the table and Settings

1. To join any RealBridge game you will need a LINK
2. All the play links will be available on ABF website https://www.bridgewebs.com/cgi-bin/bwop/bw.cgi?club=abf\&pid=display page24 AND you might also receive it by mail. 3. Click the link and you will be redirected to the log on page of our game which looks like the next figure ... Notice that your video should appear in the right bottom corner of the page and mic volume showing that it works.
3. If you can't see your video then you need to allow your browser to use your cam and mic, do as follows to allow it

4. From Goggle Chrome and just before the address bar, press the lock icon
5. Allow cam and allow mic.
6. Write your name in the required field and press login - nothing else is to be done- NO ID number will be used, (leave it blank)

## Second : Bidding, Play, Alert and System

13. At the start of any session, All the team members are required to be seated at the same table ( Table with the team name label ), the system will automatically move the EW pairs to the opponents table when we start the session and will send them back to their home table when both tables finish playing the boards.

## 14. Private chat and Table chat

- It is strongly recommended to use the chat rather than the vocal chat; the TDs will not take into consideration any vocal explanation if you have any case.
