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
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Women Championship Semi-Final Session 3 Egypt v Morocco


I suspect 4NT was quantative and if so a Pass from West would be the best bid. Virtually declarer's only hope was QIx onside, close but no cigar and so the contract drifted two off.

After the Blackwood response denying an ace East manoeuvred the contract back to no-trumps. The lead was the ♠10 taken in dummy. The ♦10 passed successfully but the ♦2 was covered by jack and

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king. Two more rounds of diamonds established the thirteenth and gave the lead to North who exited with the ♥Q making it easy for declarer to give up a club and claim. 11 IMPs to Egypt.



I cannot see a way forward for South after the 3♣ bid, perhaps North might temporise with 2♦ and then when South shows three spades she can invite or bid the spade game as she sees fit. If South cannot bid no-trumps or show three spades then you can go back to clubs. Declarer made ten tricks without much effort.

East made life easier here as after her intervention South could make a support double showing three spades and the major-suit game was soon reached. The king of hearts opening lead was taken with the



ace and a diamond played towards dummy, West rose with the ace and switched to a small club to the ♣10, queen and king. A heart was ruffed in hand and a diamond in dummy. Another heart ruff felled the ♥K and now a spade to ♠10 held and declarer cashed the ace of trumps and played a good heart discarding her remaining diamond and holding the defence to just the master trump so making plus one and 8 IMPs to Morocco

South chose the ♣8 for her opening lead, won in dummy with the ace. Declarer played ace and another heart picking up the trump queen and took a third round resting in dummy. A losing diamond finesse followed and South got off lead with another diamond. Declarer tried a spade but the defence cashed their two spade tricks and got off lead with a diamond and now declarer could choose between losing a diamond or a club for one off.

South made the unfortunate lead of the 10 – not a lead I would have made, declarer won with the queen and cashed the ace of clubs and was no doubt surprised when he lead a diamond from dummy it was ruffed by North. Now the defence played three rounds of spades which meant declarer could now crossruff in relative safety to ten tricks and the same number of IMPs.

At the end of the session Egypt had clawed back 23 IMPs but that still left a gap of 21 to be closed in the final session.

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




Open Championship Semi-Final Session 4 Report

In the last session of the semi-finals, the only match that was close was that between the two Women Teams, Egypt and Morocco. The match was not a spectacle and the play generally fairly dull. Egypt never got into their stride and lost 3I MPs in the session so Morocco qualified for the final against South Africa.

We shall take a look at a couple of interesting hands and see how they panned out in the other two semi-finals.

An interesting auction, seemingly unable to stop before the six-level. Eyeing his dummy West must have had doubts about the outcome of his contract. He received the opening lead of a trump which he won in dummy with the ♣J. A heart to hand and a heart ruff before returning to hand with a diamond, noting the fall of the queen. Another heart was lead and ruffed in dummy but overruffed by

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South who exited with a diamond and now when the other diamond honour fell declarer had the rest of the tricks. South needed to get off lead with a spade as that means declarer can no longer get to dummy to cash that precious $\blacklozenge 9$.



East simplified declarer's task when she elected to lead the queen of spades which declarer took with the king. Declarer cashed the ◆K to confirm that the diamonds were running and then played a heart to the ace, dropping East's jack. Another heart towards hand saw West go in with her king and play back a spade. Now declarer had the rest of the tricks, making twelve in all.

North preferred a negative double to a no-trump bid and South knowing of four hearts in the North hand bid the major-suit game. The lead of the \$9 was won in hand with the ace. A spade from hand saw dummy's jack inserted, losing to East's queen and promptly the queen of clubs came back, covered by the king and ruffed by West who exited with a diamond taken in dummy. Declarer now played the ♠K from dummy, discarding his losing club, to West's ace but with the position of the heart king he could not avoid the loss of a fourth trick.

With no interference it was North who declared the contract. East led the queen of clubs taken with ace. A small heart went to the ♠10 and East's jack. Now the ♣J was covered by the king and ruffed by West who then cashed his ace of spades knowing the king of hearts was good for the setting trick. The defence made three of their four trumps – maybe declarer could have handled the trump suit differently

Same auction, same lead, but at trick two declarer cashed the ace of trumps before playing another, then a diamond was cashed before another heart was played, West taking her king and exiting with the last trump. Declarer cashed her diamond winners and the king of clubs and when she led a spade in the two-card ending she made one of them for an overtrick and 13 IMPs.

Egypt in the Open and South Africa in the Women progressed to the finals.

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



You may have five hearts but you only have a six count and a lot of losers. 5NT was always going to be a struggle. North made a passive lead of a club taken in hand with the queen. A small spade to the jack held and ace another saw North on lead with her king and played another club to dummy's king. The winning spades were cashed and then a diamond to the jack and North's queen saw her cash the A and exit with a club and sit back and wait for a heart trick and the contract two off.


South decided on leading her strong suit and chose

the ♣J to declarer's ace. The ace of spades and the queen was taken by North's king. Another club was won in hand and the outstanding trumps were drawn. Declarer still had a club entry to dummy to take a successful finesse in hearts to bring home her contract – note she did not waste dummy's only entry to take a spade finesse – she was always going to have to give up a trump trick so the finesse was of little use. 11 IMPs to South Africa.



South led her jack of spades, perforce taken in dummy and the ♣10 was led which ran round to South's ace. The queen of diamonds was taken by the ace and a club saw North win with the king. He cashed the king of diamonds and gave his partner a ruff. The spade exit was taken in dummy and came to hand with a diamond ruff and then made the mistake of cashing the queen of clubs. One heart finesse could be taken but there was now no route back to hand to take a second one and so hearts had to be played off the dummy meaning one down.

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

The defence lost a tempo when a heart was led to the ♥10 and jack. The ♣9 from hand held the trick and a small diamond to the ♦10 and South's queen and the ♥K followed taken by declarer's ace and now a diamond towards the jack established declarer's ninth trick and 12 IMPs.



Why does North bother to ask? Why does North not just bid 4♠ - she has the ninth trump which is worth two or more points of anybody's money, she has only seven losers, everything screams 'Game!' It is not a great game to be in but if you consistently undervalue the ninth trump you will lose bushels of IMPs. Unsurprisingly declarer made an overtrick.
