# The Seniors and the Mixed Teams Round Robins Continue 

As the halfway stage is reached or passed in the Mixed and Senior Championships those teams that are not in top spots will need to make a forward move if they wish to take part in the World Championships in Marrakesh

In the Seniors Champioships Egypt won all three of their matches to put them one point ahead of South Africa, these two have opened up a large gap betwwen them and the other two competitors of 40 VPs .

The Mixed Championships is a much closer affair and no team is yet out of the race but those trailing will need some good wins over the next couple of days to be in the hunt. South Africa have a five point lead over Morocco and Egypt is less than four points adrift and the fifth placed team is only twelve points behind them. As I said, all to paly for.

## Senior Championship Day 1 Session 3 South Africa v Morocco

Following a small technical problem in the French countryside on Monday meant that a third session report on South Arica against Morocco in the Seniors vanished into the ether. A couple of deals caught my eye.

West had to decide whether to press on to game or rest in the part-core. The upside of a vulnerable game is considerable: +11 as opposed to -6 IMPs. I also find that if the game is going to fail it is not uncommon for even the part-score to fail. Declarer must have been please to be in the part-score after the lead of the king of clubs... until he saw the 10 fall from North, now he had a double club stop. In the fullness of time he garnered nine tricks without much difficulty.

After a Puppet Stayman enquiry and a response showing five spades the contract was set at 3 NT . A frisson of worry must have passed through declarer at the lead but to him the sight of the 10 was a joy. A small spade to the jack saw North win with the king and return a diamond taken by the ace.

Four rounds of spades ensued, North pitching a heart. South was given the lead with a club, North throwing another heart, and he exited with a diamond into declarer's tenace. Now a heart to the king saw an overtrick arrive as declarer's third heart became a trick. West's enterprise

Ona diamond lead won in dummy, a heart towards the queen was ducked by the defence and now with the spade finessing generating five tricks declarer was assured of an overtrick but in the ending the defence made a small error and so two overtricks were made.

## All Pass

From what I can gather from the convention card over $1 \boldsymbol{2}$ or shows $5-5$ in the majors and there is handwritten adjustment which is unclear-the printed text says ' $>9$ ' but it appears someone has tried to insert a less than sign so I suspect it is supposed to mean 2 shows 5-5 with less than nine points and $25-5$ with more than nine points. This discussion is to highlight that you know your system, especially in areas that are not mainstream and occur infrequently. There was obviously a misunderstanding which cost 10 IMPs.

Two Clubs showed a single suited hand and here we have another occurrence of a system failure - $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ was an obvious transfer to clubs but taken as a weak bid by partner. Convention Card says after 1NT-2x use Lebensohl but many pairs do not use it over 1NT- 2 preferring to have 'system on' with a Double of 2 being Stayman, whatever it is both partners need to be playing the same system.

I am not sure what South's course of action would have been if West had passed and partner bid $1 \star$. West's advanced pre-empt put the opposition to a guess and it looked as though it had paid off. Unfortunately not only did it put the opposition to the test it had the same effect on partner who having heard the bidding started with the ace of diamonds. Having won the trick he needed to decide what to play to trick two. Having little to guide him he continued diamonds and now declarer was home. He drew trumps and when he cashed the king and queen of clubs he could finesse against East's jack and so discard a second spade and so bring home his contract. Might the $\$ 8$ at trick one from West given a small indication to partner as what to do?

When North led his singleton diamond declarer could not amass ten tricks. If he drew trumps then he would lose two hearts and if he tried to ruff a heart in dummy the defence would get a diamond ruff, so one light and 12 IMPs to Egypt.

It seems that 4as was good bid as my finessing friend tells me the contract can be made. The queen of hearts was led and the suit continued, declarer ruffing in hand. A small trump saw North not splitting his honours and so the 10 won. Declarer now made the astounding play of a small trump from dummy. North immediately won and pushed through another heart which declarer was forced to ruff in hand and was promptly one down. I suspect it was a misclick.

South overtook North's heart lead to return a club taken in dummy with the singleton king. The jack of spades was won by North's king and a switch to the $\uparrow$ Q was taken in hand with the ace. The ace of clubs dispatched dummy's losing heart and a diamond went to the king. A diamond was ruffed in hand with the 8 , North discarding a heart rather than overruffing. The 9 held the next trick and another spade sealed North's fate and the rest of the tricks for declarer for a doubled overtrick and 12 IMPs to South Africa

I am not a fan of the $2 \diamond$ rebid, I do not know if there were system constraints but it led to 3NT being bypassed. When South led a heart, that combined with the 5-1 trump split doomed the contract. Had South chosen any other lead then it is theoretically possible to make the contract but requires some deft card reading skills. 12 IMPs to Tunisia

South Africa had had the better of the second half and ran out winners 58-33 or 15.924.08 VPs.

He switched to the $\$ 10$ covered by the jack. West took two top spades and exited in the suit. Declarer now cashed the remaining two clubs squeezing East in the red suits for an overtrick. An initial 10 IMPs to Kenya.

It was a surprise to me that on neither table did East warrant the hand worth some form of weak opening. I would have tried 2NT on the North hand for my rebid. I suspect a Double would have shown three spades. 2 NT is not perfect but it gets the sense of power over to partner. I can only assume that declarer took her eye off the ball as far as the play was concerned as in a comedy of errors the defence managed three trump tricks. 6 makes on a non club lead. !! IMPs to Reunion.

At the end of the match Reunion had won by $59-15$ or 18.55-1.45 VPs. Perhaps the boost that Reunion needed to move them up the leaderboard and into a position to fight for a berth on the caravan to Marrakesh.

Six Diamonds seems a bit unilateral. My question is: If $6 *$ makes then what are the chances that 6 succeeds? My answer is very high, secondly can you suggest hands where $6 \boldsymbol{2}$ makes but $6 \downarrow$ fails. The answer is yes just look at the hand above. In the actual play South led the ace of spades and declarer could not avoid the loss of a trump trick. Had West been playing in clubs there are just twelve top tricks - easy peasy.

Also could East make an effort over 3\& , partner must have a lot more than a minimum to bid on opposite a a possible 12 count. Declarer lost the obvious three tricks when South led a diamond.

For the Semi-final, Final and play-off sessions, It has been decided that:

- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 2 and 4 in the Semifinal match.
- The team ranked lower after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 1 and 3 in the SemiFinal match.
- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in session 2 in the Final or Play-off match.
- If Morocco team qualify to the final match in any category, there will be a 4 Segments play-off match between the semi-final losers to determine the team to qualify to Marrakesh.


## 2. All Africa Pairs tie-break procedure

If two pairs or more have the same cumulative score after the end of the 2 nd session or 4th Session, the tie shall be broken as follows:
A. The pair with the higher score in the $2 \mathrm{nd} / 4$ th session shall determine the final ranking.
