The Semi-Finals for The Mixed Commence

The Senior Round Robin is nearly a foregone conclusion, especially when Egypt beat their nearest rivals, South Africa, by a large margin and then had two more good wins which gives them a near insuperable lead.

The Mixed Round Robin was an altogether more exciting competition. Going into the last session South Africa had a lead of three points over Tunisia who, in turn, were two points in front of Egypt. In the final session the Egyptians had a whitewash over their opponents and South Africa drew against theirs. Tunisia managed a small win but it was not enough, Egypt climbed to the top with South Africa five points behind them. Tunisia failed by less than a point to finish second. While all this was happening Morocco maintained its fourth spot.

Tomorrow the semi-finals matches will be between **Egypt** against **Morocco** and **South Africa** against **Tunisia**. The first named team receives a carry over of 0.5 IMP. They will play three stanzas of sixteen boards at the same time as The Seniors Round Robin.



Nonagenarian slays competition in African bridge tournament

Johannesburg nonagenarian Joy Rothenberg is competing this week in an all-African bridge tournament, having recently received her South African colours to represent her country. On 22 May, she played against Egypt and Tunisia in the All Africa Zonals tournament and won both matches.

"It's mind-blowing to be able to get my colours and represent my country now," said Rothenberg, 93, this week shortly before the competition began. "I never thought I would get this far."

She said her bridge partner had asked her to take part in a team of six in a national competition. "I was hesitant a first, but very excited. We won, and now we're playing for South Africa."

To date, Rothenberg has only ever played at some Johannesburg bridge congresses, smaller competitions, and in an inter-club tournament. In the latter, she said, "we walked away with the cup".

Rothenberg plays socially about five times a week. "I'm part of The Links Bridge Club, but I play mostly online as it is much more convenient."

Rothenberg was born in Johannesburg in 1930 to a British mother. "We lived in London for two years, but moved back to South Africa and settled in Benoni." She met her husband when they were both 18, got married at 22, and had three children. She now has grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

In her mid-30s, Rothenberg started playing bridge and discovered she not only had a natural ability, she was also really good at teaching the game. "A friend asked me to teach her to play, and shortly thereafter, I was inundated with people asking me to teach them to play."

So, she became a bridge teacher and taught for 30 years. During that time, she wrote a book that helped people learn to play. "I contacted the Sandton Chronicle at the time, and they agreed to interview me about the book," she said. "A few days later, Exclusive Books asked if it could see the book. That led to a first order of 10 books and three months later, I had a number-one best seller. We started selling the book in Cape Town and Durban, and copies were sent to the United States and Australia."

She then started a bridge club in Rivonia with a friend of hers, which they ran for six years.

She says bridge "is fascinating no matter how old you are". What's more, as she discovered, "if you're a good player, you'll be inundated with invitations to play. The game is so good for the mind and keeping you socially active."

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

In the final session on Day 4 of the Mixed Championship Reunion and Kenya faced off against each other.







East had to cash the ace of hearts to be certain of beating the contract. When she chose a small club declarer had it easy. Winning in hand with the ♣J she cashed the ace and then played three rounds of spades, discarding a heart. Now when the king of clubs stood up she could discard her final heart and so restrict her losers to just three trump tricks so the contract succeeded and with the double there was the game bonus and 12 IMPs to Kenya.



Did East really pass throughout with nine-card suit? What follows looks perfectly normal but what a a catastrophe. Did I hear you say it was phantom sacrifice against Five Diamonds – They have three aces to cash. No they don't. How do you propose to reach East's hand for her to cash her ace. No Five Diamonds is a surprising make – I expect the person the most surprised would be declarer! The play was not the thing on this hand, the defence was not perfect but the contract was still four light -1100 in the out column.

I think Fives Spades is a bit unilateral. You have two places to play so why not start off with a double and if partner says Five Hearts you can revert to spades, you are no worse off but a bucketload of IMPs better if partner has diamonds. The defence started with the ace of clubs and a club ruff. The ace of hearts and continuation allowed East to score her small trump – if declarer ruffs high that promotes the ♠10. East chose a top of nothing ♣9 for the opening lead, perforce won in dummy. A top trump was taken in hand and the queen of clubs ran round to West's king. West facilitated declarer's task by playing a spade but declarer was always going to succeed.

A small club was taken in dummy and the ace of diamonds cashed before ruffing one in hand. The queen of clubs was passed to the king. The trump return was taken in hand. Declarer now fell from grace when she cashed a top club and discarded a spade. Her final club was ruffed by East and overruffed by dummy. Now declarer had three losing spades in his hand and so went one off. 12 IMPs to Reunion.

At the end the match Reunion had beaten Kenya by 75-33 or 18.33-1.67 VPs. This good result pushed Reunion up the table and within striking distance of the top four and so a chance to go to Marrakesh.

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


Mixed Championship Day 5 Session 1 Tunisia v Egypt







With West sure to hold the ace declarer played the ◆10 and that forced the ace. 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

Kenya venue, Cam 1




South Africa-JHB venue, Cam 1

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




Mixed Championship Day 5 Session 2 Tunisia v Reunion



The opening lead of the of the ♥7 was covered by the ♥9, king and ruffed by declarer. Two rounds of trumps were taken ending in dummy. When the queen of hearts was not covered declarer discarded a diamond. The next heart was covered and ruffed by declarer. The last trump was drawn and the ♠10 saw East rise with the ace and exit with a diamond, declarer took two rounds discarding a heart from dummy and played a spade finessing against the queen for eleven tricks.

After the ace of spades another saw declarer rise with king which was ruffed by West. West tried the ace of hearts but it was ruffed by Declare. Ace of diamonds and a diamond ruff ensued. The queen of hearts was covered and ruffed and another diamond ruffed. The queen of clubs was ruffed. Declarer now correctly ruffed a spade and all that was required was to cash the high trump drawing the opposition's remaining two and then cash the established diamonds. Unaccountably a diamond was played which pounced upon with her trump and led the queen of spades so that a further trick was available for the defence. Two down and 11 IMP



South chose a diamond taken by North's king and the return of ◆J was won in dummy. A small heart to the jack was ducked by North. Now a spade to the jack and the king of hearts was cashed. If declarer has the gift of second sight he can make the rest of the tricks by coming to hand with a spade andcashing his spade and diamond winners squeezing North, but declarer opted for the simple route of an overtrick by playing another round of hearts.

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

The auction seemed to have a life of its own and eventually ran out of steam at the five-level. This is first recoded breaking of Burn's Law, which states that you should have mor trumps than the opposition. North led a trump won in dummy and a failing heart finesse followed. North tried a small club and when dummy played low South won with his jack and pushed a diamond back through which declarer took with his ace. Declarer now drew trumps and cashed the ace of hearts. He now led a club towards dummy and put up the ace and so eventually had to lose a trick to the king. Had he finessed the contract would have succeed but if he had finessed and it had lost he would make no more tricks. Another 11 IMPs to Tunisia.

Play Links

Each category will have its own playing link (Open teams link-Women teams link .. etc.

Click the Match number, official start time or Session open time of your category to join the game. The game will be open to players 30 min before the official start time.

1. Open, Women & Mixed Categories.

For the Semi-final, Final and play-off sessions, It has been decided that:

- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 2 and 4 in the Semi-final match.

- The team ranked lower after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 1 and 3 in the Semi-Final match.

- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in session 2 in the Final or Play-off match.

- If Morocco team qualify to the final match in any category, there will be a 4 Segments play-off match between the semi-final losers to determine the team to qualify to Marrakesh.

2. All Africa Pairs tie-break procedure

If two pairs or more have the same cumulative score after the end of the 2nd session or 4th Session, the tie shall be broken as follows:

A. The pair with the higher score in the 2nd / 4th session shall determine the final ranking.

B. Mutual boards between the tied pairs - if applicable -


First : Log in , Lobby, at the table and Settings

- 1. To join any RealBridge game you will need a LINK
- 2. All the play links will be available on ABF website

3. Click the link and you will be redirected to the log on page of our game which looks like the next figure ... Notice that your video should appear in the right bottom corner of the page and mic volume showing that it works.

4. If you can't see your video then you need to allow your browser to use your cam and mic, do as follows to allow it




5. From Goggle Chrome and just before the address bar, press the lock icon

6. Allow cam and allow mic.


7. Write your name in the required field and press login – nothing else is to be done- <u>NO</u>

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

Second : Bidding, Play, Alert and System

13. 14. Private chat and Table chat


• It is strongly recommended to use the chat rather than the vocal chat; the TDs will not take into consideration any vocal explanation if you have any case.

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
When you are at Full Screen mode

- 3. Make bid




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




If you make a **mistake** or need to **explain your bid further** after you have bid, you can click on the bid and add more text.



The added text will appear after an asterisk *. The time in seconds between when the bid was **made** and the added explanation was **submitted** is presented after the added text in the square brackets, for this example, 26 seconds. The character limit on explanations is 200 characters.
