The Finals to Decide Champions of Africa

There is still one stanza of the Mixed Championships semi-finals to play. After three sessions Egypt took a near insurmountable lead against Morroco who graciously conceded. South Africa had a bad first session against Tunisia and lost a little more ground in the second but fought back in the third session to give them a chance in the fourth and final session tomorrow. The final session will start at 9.00 GMT. The Championship final will be between Egypt and the other semi-final winner,

In the Seniors Championship Egypt completed the Round Robin by a margin of more than two matches over South Africa who did the same to Morocco. So the Championship final will be between Egypt and South Africa.

The two finals will be over two sessions, the first starting at 12.30 GMT. In the Mixed Championships there will also be a play-off for third place, the two losing semi-finalists will fight it out, also over two sessions starting at 12.30.

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






Mixed Championship Day 5 Session 3 South Africa v Morocco

Tunisia won their last match by 12.29 VPs and with Egypt scoring a clean sweep, South Africa needed not to lose by more than two points to be second in the table. South Africa had Morocco, the current fourth-placed team as their opponents.


The problem with opening light is that sometimes you do not get the chance to let partner know that is what you have done and they will battle on in the belief you have a real hand. Admittedly declarer was slightly unlucky in that the defence found their heart ruff and beat the contract. but equally had South's diamond ace been the heart ace then there would have been a play for slam.

An apparent case of partnership misunderstanding. West believed 4♦ showed both majors, East did not. I suspect West was so intent on fulminating against partner's bid that he completely took his eye off the contract as he won the opening diamond lead and then ruffed one setting up a trump loser. He can still get home as North does not have another diamond to cash after taking his trump trick. Declarer has virtually no other play for the contract than North holding the four trumps, not unlikely after the weak two bid.

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


















At the end of a high scoring match with many part-scores swings South Africa held on to draw and so pipped Tunisia for the second place by a mere 0.74 VPs.

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


The correct contract nicely reached – the 3♠ bid guaranteed a spade fit. The club was taken by the ace and the suit returned for declarer's queen. Declarer cashed his four red suit winners and ruffed a heart and could safely ruff a club to hand. Now a diamond ruff and dummy's last club was ruffed with the ace and now declarer could not be prevented from taking a trick with his remaining trumps and so claimed his contract.

The ten of hearts is led and dummy's queen holds the first trick. It now comes down to how to play the diamonds for five tricks. If they are 3-2 then anything will work so we must consider the 4-1 splits. The absolute best is to play a top diamond and then lead the jack towards dummy, but that requires two entries to dummy and you have only one. Playing small towards the jack wins against singleton ten or queen in East and any singleton except the queen in the West. You could also play the seven and that is the same as the jack except it loses to the singleton 10. Both are the same and cater for 60% of the 4-1 breaks. Playing A and K succeeds 40% of the 4-1 splits. The third possibility is to lead towards dummy. Leading the jack succeeds against singleton O or 10 in West and any singleton in East except the queen, you can start with the 7 and has the same chances losing out to the ten rather than the queen, so this is 60% as well, so as long as you do not bang out the A & K you have an advantage. Of the four best methods one loses on

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


Egypt venue, Cam 1

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



All was not lost when he played back a spade for East's king, again all that was needed was a club lead but no the defence refused to take down the contract when East cashed his ace of hearts and now declarer had the rest of the tricks for a remarkable nine tricks

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



East was probably surprised after her fourth best ◆8 saw her partner discard, winning with the ◆10 declarer led a heart to the king which was allowed to hold. Now a spade to the king was captured by East's ace and another heart ducked in dummy but West was forced to win and exited with a club taken in hand and a spade to the ◆9 held. Declarer read the cards well and cashed her top tricks before exiting with a heart to West, who could cash another but was forced to lead a spade. This way declarer made the contract whoever was the guardian of the jack of spades. 10 IMPs to Reunion.

At the end of the match Egypt had a comfortable win 16.26-3.74 VPs.

Click the Match number, official start time or Session open time of your category to join the game. The game will be open to players 30 min before the official start time.

1. Open, Women & Mixed Categories.

For the Semi-final, Final and play-off sessions, It has been decided that:

- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 2 and 4 in the Semi-final match.
- The team ranked lower after the RR stage will be the Home team in sessions 1 and 3 in the Semi-Final match.
- The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in session 2 in the Final or Play-off match.
- If Morocco team qualify to the final match in any category, there will be a 4 Segments play-off match between the semi-final losers to determine the team to qualify to Marrakesh.

2. All Africa Pairs tie-break procedure

If two pairs or more have the same cumulative score after the end of the 2nd session or 4th Session, the tie shall be broken as follows:

- A. The pair with the higher score in the 2nd / 4th session shall determine the final ranking.
- B. Mutual boards between the tied pairs if applicable -

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that the process had not been followed properly in some material way, the Reviewer will ask the Head TD to correct the failings and issue a new ruling.

8. Time delay and hesitation

- It is very important to know that the TDs have the tools to produce a board report which includes the time for each bid / play by each player, so please be bare that in mind when calling the TD for a possible hesitation or before denying it.
- It is also very important to know that the TDs also have the tools to produce a session time report which includes the exact time taken by each player in a session, in case of time delay, the penalty will be given according to this report.

9. Home & Visiting teams

- When you log in to the RealBridge game (using the game link), you will find your team name written on one of the Tables.
- All team members are required to sit at their table (all together) in Pairs NS and EW, later on, when we start the session, the software will automatically move the EW pairs between the tables according to the schedule of play.
- In the schedule of play you will find Home team (the team mentioned first) and Visiting team (the team mentioned second)
- NO LINE-UP will be needed from the teams, the visiting team has to sit first at their table (in Pairs NS and EW), minimum 10 min before the official start time, and the Home team has the right to have a look at the visiting team and sit its pairs accordingly.

10. Headphones / Earphones

In order to minimize the noise in the venue as much as possible...

- It is mandatory for each player to have his own headphone / earphone which is connected to his device during play
- Use the table chat / private chat as much as possible and don't use vocal chat.
- Any vocal explanation will not be taken into the TD consideration in any case.
- You need to be very careful when using the table chat as you might give an unauthorized information to your partner which could results in adjusted score by the TD.

11. Kibitzers

- Kibitzers are not allowed by any means at 1) the playing venue, 2) RealBridge online playing room.
- All players are required to immediately leave the playing area when they finish their session, players are also kindly asked to keep their seats and not roam around the playing area.

12. Smoking, Eating and Alcohol, Mobile and electronic devices

We must act as if we were playing these championships "live", therefore, the following is strictly forbidden during play:

- Mobile phones and any other electronic devices, Mobile phones will be collected and there will be a regular check each session by the monitor.
- Eating (even if only biscuits)
- Drinking Alcohol
- Smoking
- Going to the WC without permission
- Talking loudly during or at the end of any board if the player is unhappy about his/her partner's bid, hand play or defense.



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

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

Second: Bidding, Play, Alert and System

13. At the start of any session, All the team members are required to be seated at the same table (Table with the <u>team name label</u>), the system will automatically move the EW pairs to the opponents table when we start the session and will send them back to their home table when both tables finish playing the boards.

14. Private chat and Table chat

- It is strongly recommended to use the chat rather than the vocal chat; the TDs will not take into consideration any vocal explanation if you have any case.

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














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









If you make a **mistake** or need to **explain your bid further** after you have bid, you can click on the bid and add more text.
