Peter Benjamin

Most of you know Peter Benjamin, the subject of this month's column. He is often seen promoting one of our tournaments, encouraging players to attend in addition to being a very good bridge player.

Peter was born in Brooklyn, New York prior to World War II. Soon

after his father was drafted and sent to Italy, Peter was hospitalized with Polio. After a month in the hospital, the doctor recommended the family move west, so Peter, his mother and younger brother spent a week on a steam engine train to Arizona.

His mother thought it was too hot, so they returned to New York, but after Peter contacted mumps and chicken pox in a short period of time, the family returned to Arizona for good.

Peter has fond memories of his childhood in Phoenix. At that time, there were only 50,000 people in the Phoenix area. Peter and his family lived in an area where there were no telephones or paved roads and the iceman came in a horse drawn wagon. He walked several miles to and from school each day, uphill as he tells it, both ways.

His friends were a mixture of "white eyes" and Indians with whom he played football and baseball. One summer the kids cleared an empty lot so they could play baseball. Taking notice, the parents built a backstop. The owners of the field had planned to build an apartment complex on the lot but held off telling the kids, "as long as you play, you can stay." This lasted several years.

Peter still communicates regularly by email with some friends he went to first grade with and he is part of the reunion committee for their 60th high school reunion in 2017.

After high school, Peter tried to enlist in the service

Management Report

At the Phoenix NABC board meeting, Robert Hartman, our CEO presented his Management Report. I will focus on that report this month.

Membership

At the end of October 2013 ACBL membership stands at 167,912. This is a net gain of 1,504 additional members which is the highest gain in a single year since 1993.

Tournaments

Through October, Regional table count was down 6% with three fewer Regionals. Sectional table count was down 2% but STaCs were up 10%.

Atlanta NABC Review

Table count in Atlanta was 12,364 compared to the pre-tournament estimate of 12,500. The actual revenue over expenses was \$217,000 which was higher than projected. The post-NABC survey showed continued overall player satisfaction with over 85% of respondents either strongly agreed or agreed with the statement, "My overall experience with the Atlanta NABC was

Club Tables Through September 2013: Face to face club table count was down 2.4% at 1,660,202 tables while online table count was 704,528 which is a 4.7% increase. Overall club table count is down by less than one half of one percent.

Other items of interest are that final drafts of the Youth Protection and Abuse Prevention Policy and the Substance Abuse Prevention Policy are almost completed, David White, a District 23 tournament director, has been hired to work as the internal programmer for the new ACBL Score+ project, and that the new ACBL Style Guide is complete and implementation at the corporate level has begun.

Finally, the Bridge Bulletin continues to be improved both in appearance and pages. Any comments you may have about the new look are welcomed.



but a football head injury kept him

Peter's bridge life began when his brother brought home a friend with whom he played Honeymoon Bridge. The game fascinated Peter, so he dragged his brother to a local church where they held a duplicate bridge game. Peter was hooked. Some of the best Phoenix players noted his talent and took him under their wings.

In 1962 the fall Nationals were held in Phoenix. One event was the Team Trials for players to qualify for international play. Peter was hired as a recorder to keep track of the bidding and opening leads of each hand. This was an opportunity to kibitz the finest players of the day including the teams of Charles Goren and Helen Sobel, Oswald Jacoby and Bobby Nail, Mike Shuman and Alvin Roth, Howard Schenken and Peter Leventritt, and Tobias Stone and John Crawford. Best bridge lessons he could have imagined, and they paid him.

In 1966, Peter played against Virginia Hull and partner at a Phoenix Regional. She encouraged him to move to Los Angeles. So Peter gave two week's notice and moved to Los Angeles with his girlfriend. Virginia offered him her spare bedroom, helped him find a

job, and introduced him to the Los Angeles bridge community.

Peter met his wife Sheila Labor Day weekend on 1974. She was taking bridge lessons with her mother from Lee Henry at the Wild Whist Bridge Clubs. They began dating and playing bridge together. After a short time Sheila told Peter that they could play bridge together or they could get married, but not both. He chose well and they married a short three months after meeting. They celebrated #39 this past December. Today they own a print shop and pursue separate hobbies. Peter collects coins and plays bridge and Sheila does miniatures.

Problem Solvers' Panel

You South hold: ♠ -- ♥9762 ♦T85 ♣AT8643 What call do you make?

GOLDSMITH: 7. We probably only go for 500 in 7♣ versus their grand slam. How to get to play in 7♣? If West has the club void, nothing will work, as he'll make some forcing pass or cue bid, and East will bid a grand. If West has the club, an immediate 7♣ gives us a decent chance for a good result. [Jeff assumed 5NT was "pick a slam." But with only one suit bid, most would play that it asks partner to bid 7♥ with 2 of the top 3 honors]. Should I show my void? West will double and someone will bid 7♠. How about psyching a void I don't have $(6 \spadesuit)$? A clever West might pass to let East play the hand, but psyching might work. I'll be prosaic and bid 7♣, hoping that their problem is hard enough. Mine sure is. If East bids 7♥, I'll have another problem, which I ought to solve before bidding 74, but I've written more than enough already.

JONES: 6♠. What a fun hand! A spade lead from partner will obviously beat 7♥. If RHO declares 7♠, I will lead a heart (whether partner doubles or not), and expect partner to ruff. 7NT is already wrong sided with me on opening lead. I'll double and likely take the first seven tricks against 7NT. If I wind up on lead against 7♠, I'll again lead a heart for partner to ruff. 7♣ is not going down more than three tricks. I think the best the opponents can do at this point is to NOT double 6♠ and let me play there undoubled down 12

for minus 600.

MR. MEALYMOUTH: $7 \clubsuit$. This will be a profitable save if they double, and at the same time, avoid warning them of the Lightner Double I shall make if they bid $7 \heartsuit$ (partner will Lightner-double if East then guesses to run to $7 \spadesuit$).

SWANSON: 7♣. West is certain to bid 7♥ which I will double for a spade lead. That is, if East is planning to play in hearts rather than spades.

WITTES: 6♠. Seems clear cut. I'm going to take the 7♠ dive against 6♥, and I want a spade lead against 7♥. I hope partner has the good sense not to bid 7♠ over 7♥ (LOL).

Rarely is bridge so close to poker as it is on this hand. Do you bluff, raise the pot or stand pat? It seems like $7\clubsuit$ is only going down 3 or 4 tricks versus the opponents' sure small slam. Should they bid $7\blacktriangledown$, you can double and hope partner leads a spade rather than a diamond. Should they bid $7\spadesuit$, you can lead a heart and hope partner can ruff. There is no guarantee — East may have something like $\spadesuit AKQJTxx \blacktriangledown KJx \spadesuit Axx$ \spadesuit —- and intend to play $7\spadesuit$ all along.

GOLDSMITH: 4♠. The ♠9 may be a good card. I figure partner has something like ♠KQ108xx ♥x ♠Kxx ♠Kxx. Game isn't cold, but it's good enough.

JONES: 3NT. This is a tough problem. It's fairly easy to come up with layouts where our best contract is either 3♠, 3NT, 4♥, or 4♠. 3NT has the advantage that that partner is still in the picture. He will be somewhat reluctant to pass 3NT. [I don't see why partner wouldn't accept your decision] If he bids again he will be right. I would love to see a simulation on this problem.

MR. MEALYMOUTH: Pass. My hearts are too weak for 4∇ , my hand is too weak for 3NT, and I'd want the spade queen to raise to $4\triangle$.

SWANSON: Pass. I suppose I could pretend it is IMPs and take a shot at 4♥, but the best chance for a plus score is to pass 3♠ and hope partner's spade suit doesn't have many holes. I will put in an advertisement for using a 2♠ response to 1♥ (or one of a minor) as invitational so I don't have to go set in 3♠ so often.

WITTES: 4. I'm playing partner for a very good suit, probably 7 cards, and little else. We may need a diamond finesse or a trump break to make, but worth the risk.

At IMP's, bidding a game seems right, though it's not clear which one is best. At matchpoints, however, there is less motivation to bid game than there is to achieve a plus score. I'm for going low on this hand and passing 3.

GOLDSMITH: DBL. This shows a penalty double of spades with tolerance for hearts. I don't know that 2♥ is going down, but passing seems too cowardly when their primary source of tricks may be endplaying me in spades.

JONES: DBL. Are the backs of the cards all the same color? Looking at what the other players have shown, there shouldn't be nearly this much left for me. I doubt that doubling will be met by three consecutive green cards. I'm going to guess that partner will bid 3♣ [why would partner ever pull when they haven't promised much of anything?], which I will pass. But if I am on lead against 2♥X, I'll lead the trump ace and probably follow that with the ♣A and then my second heart.

MR. MEALYMOUTH: Pass. The auction isn't over (West may be about to raise or take a spade preference) [dream on Mr. M!], so despite my spade stack, I won't double until the opponents appear to have finished bidding. I've seen too many high cards ruffed off and too many contracts make on fit.

SWANSON: 3♠. I would prefer to defer my call until after West bids. As the rules don't provide for that and I am unwilling to defend 2♥ in the blind, I'll risk 3♣.

WITTES: 3♣. Partner must have a good 6-card club suit and little else. By raising clubs, the opponents might also get too high in hearts, thinking their length in clubs means partner is short. The only thing that bothers me a little is why didn't partner open 3♣ at this vulnerability?

It's certainly possible that partner didn't open 3♣ because he also has 4 hearts. In that case, the opponents are mired in bidding quickstand if I start doubling. On the other hand, will partner ever pull with ♠x ♥xx ♠Qxx ♠KJT9xxx? Yes, partner could have opened 3♠, but can you blame her for bidding now?

GOLDSMITH: 3♣. The only easy one of the set. Yes, a 4-3 heart fit might be best, but there's lots of room between 3♣ and 4♥ to find one if we need to, and unlike Marshall, I'm not willing to commit to hearts immediately.

JONES: 3♣. The only alternative is 3♥, but that will get partner to overestimate my trump length. My clubs are reasonable, so I'll rebid them. This would be a bigger headache before the days of 2/1 game forcing. If partner bids 3♦ or 3♥, I'll support hearts.

MR. MEALYMOUTH: 3♣. Depends on system. An automatic 3♦ playing old fashioned Standard American, an automatic 3♣ playing 2/1.

SWANSON: 3♣. These cards provide a temptation to bid 3♥, likely heading to a 4-3 heart game. The club ten keeps me on the straight path, going with the field. If partner holds the doubleton jack, notrump is apt to provide not only a better play for game, but a higher scoring one.

WITTES: 3♣ (if playing 2/1). If not, I guess I have to bid 3♦, though I don't like it.

It seems to me that the panelists are not envisioning partner's problem after a 3♣ rebid. What can he/she do with ♠AKxxx ♥QJxx ♠Qxx ♣x other than bid 3NT which would seem to be a very poor contract whereas 4♥ has much better play?

What call do you make?

GOLDSMITH: 5♠. Who knows? 5♠ may be cold or it may be a good save versus 4♠ or a stupid contract versus ♠KQ10x ♥Kxxx ♠x ♣xxxx. If West is 6-5 (or 5-5) in the blacks, I've done the right thing. If he's 18-19 balanced, I can still catch ♠Jxxxx ♥Kxx ♠Qx ♣xxx. With 13 spades missing, I suspect West's hand is mostly black cards, so let's put on some pressure.

JONES: 1. Why make some exotic or misdescriptive bid here? With the other 3 players having 25 black cards between them, someone ALWAYS bids. I will bid 3♥ or 4♥ on the next round. Partner should then have a decent view of my hand.

MR. MEALYMOUTH: 1•. Then hearts, more hearts and more diamonds, if necessary. Yes, I expect about three more turns if I take it slow. [Optimistic Mr. M that the 13 spades out there will remain silent.]

SWANSON: 1. The breaks will have to be really ugly for this to be set.

WITTES: 2. Should be intermediate. If the auction is kept alive (hopefully), I will bid and rebid hearts.

I'm surprised that no panelist suggested 3. That would make it much more difficult for West to bid again with an intermediate 6-5 or 5-5 type hand.
