Review of Responder's rebid

• Purpose:

- Place the contract ...
- Responder has a lot of information may have already 3 or 4 bids
- Value and shape of **Opener's** hand based on Opener's rebid can be key
- Responder must think of value and shape of combined hands

<u>Responder</u> strength categories

- Minimum or Small 6 to 9 total points
- Medium 10 or 11 total points
- Maximum or Large 12 or more total points

Responder now rebids based on the Opener's rebid.

Was Opener's hand a Small, Medium or Large hand?

Responder's Rebid if Opener shows Minimum hand (13 to 15 points)

- 3 types of Responder bids
 - Part score with 6 to 9 points
 - Invitational bid with 10 or 11 points
 - Push for game with 12+ points use a forcing bid or go to game if the suit is established

Responder's Rebid if Opener shows Medium hand (16 to 18 points)

- Responder rebids
 - Possible part score with 6 to 7 points if there is a fit or possibly NT with no fit
 - Consider invitational bid for 8 to 9 points
 - Push for game with 10+ points use a forcing bid or go to game if the suit is established

As Responder, think of the 3 "M's"

Minimum - 6 to 9 Medium - 10 or 11 Maximum - 12+

Answer: Pass	game. Stay low and safe.

Answer: 2 ♦	6 pts & unbalanced hand. NT not a good place to be. 2 ♦ is a non-forcing bid. Partner will Pass.

Answer: 2 ♠		fit. Probably not enough for game. Go back to partner's first bid. Stay safe.

Answer:	3 👲	10 pts & good club fit. Invite game by raising clubs to show high card values and club fit.

Responder's hand

Answer: 4♥

9 pts. Opener is showing to 16 - 18 pts and 6 hearts. You know there are 8 hearts in the hands. Enough for game....bid 4 hearts.

As Responder, think of the 3 "M's"

Minimum - 6 to 9 Medium - 10 or 11 Maximum - 12+

Quiz #1 - All About Bidding

- 1. Partner opens the bidding with 1H or 1S, what do you know about their hand?
 - Answer: they have 13-21 Total Points and at least five cards in the suit they bid
- 2. Partner opens the bidding with 1C, what three things do you know about their hand?
 - Answer: they have 13-21 Total Points, three + clubs and NO five-card major
- 3. Partner opens the bidding with 1NT, what do you know about their hand?
 - Answer: they 15-17 High Card Points and a balanced hand
- 4. What are the point ranges for Minimum, Medium, Maximum hands for the OPENER?
 - Answer: Minimum=13-15; Medium=16-18, Maximum= 19-21 Total Points
- 5. What are the ranges for Minimum, Medium, Maximum hands for the RESPONDER?
 - Answer: Minimum=6-9; Medium=10-11, Maximum= 12+ Total Points
- 6. What is the definition of a balanced hand?
 - Answer: No void, no singleton, and no more than one doubleton
- 7. You are going to open the bidding and you have a five-card diamond suit and a fivecard heart suit, which one do you open?
 - Answer: Hearts
- 8. You are going to open the bidding and you have a five-card heart suit and a five-card spade suit, which one do you bid?
 - Answer: Spades
- 9. You are going to open the bidding and you have a six-card Club suit and a five-card spade suit, which one do you bid?
 - Answer: Clubs

- 10. With this hand, what do you open? ♠K9 ♥AK4 ♦J 953 ♣K 1098
 - Answer: 1 Diamond
- 11. With this hand, what are you going to open? **•** KJ9 **•** A954 **•** AJ9 **•** J83
 - Answer: 1 Club
- 12. You open the bidding 1H and your partner responds 2H. What do you know?
 - Answer: Partner had 6-9 total points and at least 3 hearts
- 13. You open the bidding 1S and your partner responds 1NT. What do you know?
 - Answer: Partner has 6-9 total points and fewer than 3 spades
- 14. What is a golden fit?
 - Answer: When you and your partner have at least 8 cards (combined) in a suit
- 15. What are the three golden game contracts? How many points?
 - Answer: Contract of 4H/4S (25+ total points and golden fit). If you have a golden fit in a minor suit and 25 or more combined total points Contract of 3NT
- 16. Typically, how many combined points does it take to make game in a minor suit?
 - Answer: 29

- 17. Your partner opens 1C and you have 6-9 Total Points, what is your first priority? What are your next priorities?
 - Answer: 1st priority = Bid a new suit at the one level. Bid the higher ranking of two five-card suits; Bid the lower ranking of two four-card suits.
 - Answer: Next bid 1NT. Third priority Support partner's suit by bidding 2 C with five-card support. Review Page 112!
- 18. Partner opens 1S and you have 10-11 points and 3+ cards in spades, what do you do?
 - Answer: Bid 3 Spades
- 19. You open the bidding 1NT and your partner responds with 2C. What is he/she asking? What do you know about responder's hand?
 - Answer: Do you have a 4-card major?
 - Answer: Partner has at least 8 points, one or more 4-card majors, and shortness in at least one suit (shortness means a doubleton or less). Partner is trying to find a Golden Fit.
- 20. Partner opens the bidding 1NT and you hold a balanced hand and 11 HCP. What should you respond?
 - Answer: 3NT

- 21. You have 18 points total points and 5 hearts. You open the bidding with 1 Heart. Partner responds with 1 NT. How many total points does partner have? Therefore, how many combined points might you have? What is your next bid?
 - Answer: 6-9
 - Answer: 24-27.
 - Answer: It depends! Perhaps 3NT if balanced, otherwise bid your best second suit. Review pages 155-157.
- 22. If you intend to support your partner's suit, how might you change the evaluation of your hand? How do you count Dummy points?
 - Answer: Instead of counting HCP plus length points, count HCP plus Dummy points.
 - Answer: 1 point for a doubleton, 3 points for a singleton, 5 points for a void.
