"I think my friend is dead!" he yells. "What can I do?"


The operator says, "Calm down. First, let's make sure he's dead."

Most hands are horse races. Declarer must set up his winners before the defense does. This is the home of Pattern Theory.

Declaring Strategies




- 1) Count your winners and losers.
- 2) Find ways to increase winners and reduce losers.
- 3) Look for long suits (not trumps) in either hand that can be established. Will finessing help?
- 4) Can you ruff on the short side of trumps (suit contracts only)?
- 5) Look for <u>obscure</u> plays, like squeezes, coups and end plays.

By the way, very few hands are 'mirror images'.

But how do I decide which long suit to establish?

Declarer's considerations:

- 1) Do I ruff things on the short side of trump, or should I draw trumps?
- 2) Which long suit(s) can I establish?
- 3) How do I get back to the long suit, once it's established?

Ignore trumps—they're for ruffing and transportation, not discarding.

Pattern Theory says that the only sluffs are coming from the club suit.

It's important to set the clubs up before drawing trumps, since Declarer may have to ruff his third heart in the Dummy.

PLAN OF ATTACK:

"Yes, that was very loud, but I said

Duck the K♥ lead and take the next one.

Ruff a v in dummy and play a low club to your 8♣.

Draw trumps and cash the K♣.

Cross to Dummy's A♦ and take a ruffing finesse in clubs against the Q4.



Pattern Theory says it is usually not wise to lead a non-trump suit known to be long in either

declarer's hand or the dummy's hand. Setting up side suits is declarer's job, not defenders!



Remember, timing is everything on defense.

- If East has 5⁺ hearts, he would've opened 1H.
- If East has 3 or less hearts, South would have 5+ hearts, and he would've overcalled 1H.
- Therefore, East and South must each have exactly 4 hearts.
