Lastly I will like to congratulate Mr. Sartaj Hans (a young player from Delhi, who was my partner once upon a time) and who is currently based in Sydney, Australia. Sartaj is going great guns in Australia and his team reached the Finals of Team of Four in the Gold Coast congress, where they lost by 14 IMPs. Keep it up Sartaj.

PUPPET STAYMAN

In the August Bulletin, we discussed the very common Stayman 2C bidding sequences over 1NT Opening. Many people use Stayman over strong 2NT as well. As it is very common to bid 2NT holding a 5 card major, many bridge players prefer to use Puppet Stayman over strong 2NT.

There are various versions of Puppet Stayman, each with some particular drawbacks. However the version presented below based on Romex Puppet Stayman is perhaps the best one. This method generally makes the stronger hand declarer and responder has additional bidding space to show a hand containing 5 spade and 4 hearts. Also if required responder can discover 5 card or 4 card minors through relay sequences.

Responses and Re-bids after Strong 2NT

Responder bids 3C as puppet Stayman, 3D/H & 4D/H as transfer to H/S, 3S to show slammish hands with one or both minors. The following are the various responses and re-bids to 3C (Puppet Stayman) bid:

With the above sequences, it is possible to discover 4-4 or 5-3 major as well as minor suit fits. Responder can first try for major suit fit, failing which he can either show his 5-card minor or ask opener for his distribution, if responder is interested in Slam. Whenever responder relays at 4-level for distribution, 4NT will be to play.

We would strongly recommend the above version for those who like to play Puppet Stayman.

Cavendish Pairs Tournament

A Cavendish Pairs Bridge Tournament was held at Ahmedabad on 7th & 8th February 2004. 24 Sponsors and 24 professionals were invited for this interesting event and were paired together through slips picked randomly. The random pairing and the auctioning of the pairs were held on the evening of 6th Feb 2004.

As many of the Sponsors themselves were excellent players, the auction turned out to be very exciting. The young Sandeep Thakral got paired with the seasoned Ashok Ruia and the pair was sold for a whopping 1.6 Lacs, which turned out to be the highest bid for a pair. The other pairs to attract the attention in the auction were: Rajesh Dalal – Nitin Shah, Anil Padhye – Amita Raithatha, J.M. Shah – Ariz Anklesaria & Kiran Nadar - N.K. Gupta.

The tournament was held with IMP scoring with maximum 20 IMPs to be gained or lost in a 4-board match, each pair playing with the other 23 pairs. Finally it was the pair of RAJESH DALAL – NITIN SHAH who won the tournament with a score of 563 (+103), keeping the confidence of the auctioneers on them intact. PYC Hindu Gymkhana, organized the "Golden Era" Super Bowl Bridge Championships at PYC Hindu Gymkhana, Pune from 12th Feb to 15th Feb 2004, in memory of its late members.

Team of Four Event:

The tournament started with the Team of Four event, in which 44 Teams participated. After a Swiss league of 9 rounds (10 boards each), the top 6 teams, which qualified for the Super League, were: SUNIL MACHHAR, J.P. GOENKA, AGSAR PAINT 'A', AGSAR PAINT 'B', JERO MANGO & TOLANI SHIPPING. Formidables, out of the participating top teams could not make it to the last six.

In the 5 * 10 boards super league, J.P. Goenka & Agsar Paint 'A' came first & second respectively to go through the Finals. The Super league scores were:

The Pairs Tournament started with a 3-session (of 22 boards each) elimination I round. 96 Pairs played in 6 sections and 22 NS & 22 EW qualified for elimination II from Section ABC & DEF respectively. The 12 pairs playing in the T-4 Super league joined these 44 pairs. From the 2-session Elimination II round, 32 pairs qualified for the 62 boards Finals.

Raju Tolani - Vinay Desai, won the Pairs event. Keyzad Anklesaria – Sapan Desai came 2^{nd} and the pair of V.M. Lal – Kamal Mukherjee was 3^{rd} . The winners got Rs. 25,000 and the 2^{nd} & 3^{rd} positions received Rs. 15,000 & Rs. 10,000 respectively.

The tournament was very well organized and PYC team with excellent technical support from Mr. Suhas Vaidya deserves all the credit for the excellent arrangements & hospitability.

The XVIIIth All India Shriniwas Lohia Bridge Tournament under the kind patronage and Presidentship of Shri B.P. Birla was organized by Kanpur Bridge Association at the Ganges Club, Arya Nagar, Kanpur from 19th Feb to 22nd Feb 2004.

Team of Four Event:

52 Teams participated in this event. After 10 rounds of swiss league (each of 10 boards), Maya Mira (204 VPs), Dhampur Sugar Mills (203), Manas Saha IV, Kolkatta (186), Kochas, Kolkatta (180), S.P. Sinha, Patna (178), SCPCC (172), ABC Kanpur (169), & Central Sec. Club (168) qualified for the QFinals.

In the 2*10 boards Quarter Finals, Maya Mira (Vijay Goel, Kingshuk Bhattacharya, Tapas Mukherjee, Ashim Mukherjee, Kalyan Nandi & Sukomal Das) beat Central Sec. Club by 51-31 (21-18, 30-13); Dhampur Sugar Mills (Ashok Goel, Kamal Mukherjee, Manas Mukherjee, Rana Roy, Subroto Saha) beat ABC Kanpur by 85-31 (46-16, 39-15); Manas Saha IV (Manas Saha, Pranob Roy, H. Hasan, Prasanta Bera, Santanu Chaudhary, Snehashish Roy) beat SCPCC by 48-27 (33-7, 15-20); Kochas (S.P. Ghosh, D.S. Roy Chaudhary, G. Banerjee, J. Sarkar) beat S.P. International Bridge News

9th NEC Cup Bridge Festival 2004

The 9th NEC Cup Bridge Festival 2004 was held at Yokohama, Japan from 9th to 15th Feb 2004. It boasted of the largest and one of the strongest international fields ever at NEC cup, including many of the world's top players. Stage One was an 8-round Swiss Teams consisting of 20-board matches, IMPs converted to Victory Points, qualifying eight teams for the KO phase. The 52-team field was divided into top and bottom halves and the first Swiss match was arranged in a fashion, that each team in the top half matched at random against a team from the bottom half. The subsequent match pairings were based on current VP totals.

The team from the USA (Garey Hayden, Jim Robison, Simon Kantor, Mark Itabashi) defeated the team from Poland/Russia (Adam Zmudzinski, Cezary Balicki, Andrew Gromov, Alexander Petrunin) 21-9 in the final Swiss match to take the top qualifying spot for the NEC Cup quarterfinals. Indonesia (Henky Lasut, Eddy Manoppo, Santje Panelewen, Franky Karwur, Munawar Sawiruddin) and Israel (Israel Yadlin, Doron Yadlin, Michael Barel, Migry Zur Campanile) round out the other two top-four qualifiers followed by Canada, Germany/USA, China Ladies and the defenders, England. 
In the 60 board finals, the Newzealand team Blackstock beat Hans 134-120 (48-47, 28-38, 35-24, 23-11)

Interesting Deal From LOHIA Bridge Tournament

You often feel, why good players require so many gadgets and signaling systems to defend a hand. An average player will do what he thinks is best to defeat a contract not bothering too much about the Card Count and ducking mechanism. His idea is simple - If one strategy is not working he just shifts to another suit, with a prayer that the new strategy may work. Unluckily most of the times things does not work out well for the poor soul and then they have to hear a long lecture from either their partner or the opponents itself. But sometimes, the average player may bid and play a hand in a manner unknown to the TOP class players, getting the long awaited applause from the kibitzers (if there are any) and a story to tell to his team members. This is exactly what happened on the following board from the Lohia Pairs Final:



The bidding went as follows:

West	NorthEast	South	
	Pass	Pass	1D (1)
Pass	1S	Pass	2D
Pass	3NT	All Pass	

(1) - Precision 11-15 HCP with minimum 2 carder •

The bidding was very simple and poor West, with nothing best to lead choose the \fivet J. The declarer seeing the dummy got slightly perplexed at the thought of loosing 4 or 5 club tricks along with the Diamond Ace, but trying his best played the VA from dummy and a diamond to the Ten. The TOP player smoothly ducked and the declarer continued with the Diamond to dummy. West again ducked (may be he wanted to know the count). Now declarer did something unusual by playing a low heart from dummy. East stared at South (declarer felt as if he is saying: You fool! Do you thing my King is going to come doubleton and you will get a trick for your queen. I know my partner has led from JTx or JT) and smoothly ducked the **V**K. Declarer took the **V**10 and reeled off his 5 spades to make the contract and a big round of applause from the kibitzers (luckily they were there this time)

UNDERSTAND LAWS OF DUPLICATE CONTRACT BRIDGE

LAW 45 - CARD PLAYED

Law 45 is perhaps the most frequent judgement ruling the director is called upon to make and is one of the most difficult rulings for players to accept because it usually costs an offender/declarer a trick or two.

➤ A – Play of Card from a Hand

Each player except dummy plays a card by detaching it from his hand and facing it on the table immediately before him.

B – Play of Card from Dummy

Declarer plays a card from dummy by naming the card, after which dummy picks up the card and faces it on the table. In playing from dummy's hand declarer may, if necessary, pick up the desired card himself.

C – Compulsory Play of Card

- 1. Defender's Card A defender's card held so that it is possible for his partner to see its face must be played to the current trick (if defender has already made a legal play to the current trick, see Law 45E).
- 2. Declarer's Card Declarer must play a card from his hand held face up, touching or nearly touching the table, or maintained in such a position as to indicate that it has been played.
- 3. Dummy's Card A card in the dummy must be played if it has been deliberately touched by declarer except for the purpose of arranging dummy's cards, or of reaching a card above or below the card or cards touched.
- 4. Named or Designated Card
 - a. Play of Named Card A card must be played if a player names or otherwise designates it as the card he proposed to play.
 - b. Correction of Inadvertent Designation A player may, without penalty, change an inadvertent designation if he does so without pause for thought; but if an opponent has, in turn, played a card that was legal before the change in designation, that opponent may withdraw without penalty the card so played and substitute another (see Law 47E).
- 5. Penalty Card A penalty card, major or minor, may have to be played, subject to Law 50.

D – Card Misplayed by Dummy

If dummy places in the played position a card that declarer did not name, the card must be withdrawn if attention is drawn to it before each side has played to the next trick, and a defender may withdraw (without penalty) a card played after the error but before attention was drawn to it; if declarer's RHO changes his play, declarer may withdraw a card he had subsequently played (see Law 16C2).

➤ E – Fifth Card Played to Trick

- 1. By a Defender A fifth card contributed to a trick by a defender becomes a penalty card, subject to Law 50, unless the Director deems that it was led, in which case Law 53 or Law 56 applies.
- 2. By Declarer When declarer contributes a fifth card to a trick from his own hand or dummy, there is no penalty unless the Director deems that it was led, in which case Law 55 applies.

➤ F – Dummy Indicates Card

After dummy's hand is faced, dummy may not touch or indicate any card (except for purpose of arrangement) without instruction from declarer. If he does so, the Director should be summoned forthwith. The Director shall rule whether dummy's act did in fact constitute a suggestion to declarer. When the Director judges that it did, he allows play to continue, reserving his right to assign an adjusted score if the defenders were damaged by the play so suggested.

➢ G – Turning the Trick

No player should turn his card face down until all four players have played to the trick.

BRIDGE HUMOUR

The famous professional player Eric Paulsen comes back to Upland, his California hometown after being a member of the U.S team that had just won the 1976 World Championships in Monte Carlo.

The local players are surprised to see him playing with a client at the evening duplicate, but there he is and about halfway through the game he is competing in spades against the opponents who are bidding hearts. Finally, he bids 3 Spades, loudly, so he won't get doubled. It doesn't work.

The player to his left doubles. Paulsen looks at him and says: "Do you Know who I am?' The guy says: "Yes I know who you are." The champion continues: "Do you know how many masterpoints I have?" The guy replies, stone-faced: "No, but do you know how many spades I have?"
