The good news is that the organisation is in great hands and our new leadership remains focussed on EBED's two main priorities:


- A national bridge education and training framework and,



The North hand is not quite worth a slam try in my opinion – the aforementioned 4333 distribution being a reason to downgrade (or at least not to upgrade). However, even if North does bid a quantitative 4NT, it is not clear that South should accept.

At matchpoints, what should West lead? Maybe a passive club is best. Declarer can make 11 tricks, by cashing his black-suit winners and ♥A-K before exiting in hearts, but why should he? It is more likely he will take a heart finesse, and later a diamond finesse. Though maybe he should get it right because of West's passive lead.



Maybe that West hand does not have a good enough spade suit to open 2♠ vulnerable; maybe that East hand is too full of soft values to make a game try.

Anyway, EW should be able to stop in $3 \stackrel{•}{\sim}$. Mind you, in practice $4 \stackrel{•}{\sim}$ will surely make. North will either lead a top diamond, or the $\stackrel{•}{\sim}$ Q, after which game is cold (in theory after a club lead; in practice declarer is likely to play for North to hold the $\stackrel{•}{\sim}$ A rather than the $\stackrel{•}{\sim}$ A-K).

The only way to beat 4♠ for sure is for North to lead a heart and South to switch to a club.
