
#### A Quote From Terence Reese

The success of a deceptive play seems to depend on a variety of circumstances, such as the smoothness with which it is performed and the quality of the player whom you seek to deceive.

To some extent that is true, but there is, nevertheless, a technique to be learned.

Your opponent, if an experienced player, may *suspect* that you are using one of the standard forms of deception; but may not be sure, for the essence of a good deceptive play is that the card might be genuine, or it might be a *trap*.

#### Let the fun begin with some great examples




West leads the heart five.

When dummy tables south counts her winners. One spade three hearts and four clubs. Short two tricks and they will need to come from the diamond suit.

Note: south must play the diamond suit twice in order to set them up. Also note south holds only one spade stopper.

If south makes a hasty play of the heart jack and the three from her hand the jig is up. The opponents know it is useless to continue hearts and when you try to sent up the diamonds they will switch to spade. South will lose three spades and two diamonds.

At trick one south must play the jack and cover with the king. This makes the opponents think she holds only a doubleton heart in her hand so will continue the suit. South now has time to set up the diamonds while still holding her spade control.




## False-carding when you suspect a ruff is threatened.

South you know east holds at least four diamonds which makes it possible west leading his singleton.

East wins the ace.

Declarer drop the king. Now look at the situation from east's point of view. What would be going through your mind if you were east?



## How to discourage a cover.

West leads the spade queen from his sequence. South, count your winners, two spades and two hearts. You need five more and as you are missing both minor suit aces you will not have the timing to get them both out before the opponents have set up their hearts.

Time to get trickly.

Win the spade and play a low heart to the king. Now your critical deception. Play the club jack pretending to finesse either the king or queen and hope east holds the ace and falls for your deception. He should.

If he ducks you now abandon the club suit and set up the diamond suit. West will take the ace and play another spade however it is too late. # From our club manager Kelly:

Greetings everyone! Today I would like to address the age old question "To claim or not to claim?" As a player, I can attest to the fact that it feels really good to be able to say, "the rest of the tricks are mine!"

As a game director, I can say that properly made claims really help to keep the game moving. In our Open games we allot 20 minutes per round when we are playing 3 boards and 14 minutes per round when we are playing 2 boards. From time to time a player will come across a challenging hand that requires extra time to play. Hopefully the other board(s) in the round will be simpler – and this is where claiming as soon as possible really helps to keep things on track at the club.

Here are a couple of tips to help you make a claim properly:

 If you are in a trump contract, then it is essential that you address how you are going to pull any trump remaining in the opponents' hands. If you do not state how you are going to pull the opponent's trump then the director is required to assume that you did not realize there were

outstanding trump, and if there is a reasonable way that the opponents could get a ruff then they are entitled to that trick. Make sure you say – I am going to pull your remaining trump and then play .....!

 Unless it is obvious that all the remaining tricks are yours, state the order in which you are going to play the remaining tricks so that your opponents get a clear understanding of what is going on.

Remember – properly made claims give you more time to wrestle with the other challenges you are going to face at the bridge table!
