What is your 2/1 agreement?

Playing 2/1 most pairs agree that $1 \vee -2 \wedge /2$ is a Game Force bid. However, what is your agreement about opener's rebids in an uncontested auction?

Is the bid of 2♠ a reverse? Does 2♥ promise a 6/5 card suit? What does 2NT or 3♣/3♦ show?

There is no universal agreement playing 2/1; hence opener's re-bids must be discussed. For example, Bergen, Lawrence, Hardy, among others have suggested "can" responses/suggestions!

Because many pairs play Bergen or Reverse Bergen, the commonly used responses for the sequence are:

1♥ - **2**♣ -?

- 2♥ Shows a 6-card suit
- Not a reverse not extra values just a 4-card suit
- 2NT Shows 5-3-3-2 and says nothing about stoppers
- 3♦ Shows diamonds and no extras
- 3♥ Solid suit slam interest
- **4♥** To play

Yes, very simple responses and easily finds an 8-card fit in the major with only two. The bid of 3NT provides no information to the opponents, but often wrong sides the contract. However, the bid of $2 \spadesuit$ and $3 \spadesuit$ are ambiguous with a range of 11 or 16+ and 3NT may be a disaster!

Can the responses be improved? Yes, there is a convention called the John Schuler Shift, from San Diego, California. It goes:

1 **v** - 2 ***** -?

- 2♥ A waiting bid shows a 5-card suit, likely 5-3-3-2
- 2♠ Is a reverse or shows a 6-4 hand

2NT* Artificial shows 6+hearts with stoppers

- 3♦ Shows 5-5 with extras or without extras shows 5-4 or 6-5 shape
- 3♥ Slam interest
- 4♥ To play

When one opens $1 \checkmark$ and partner responds $1 \spadesuit$, does partner show 4 or 5 spades? Most playing 2/1 with a strong 1NT=15-17 agree that it shows 6+points and 4+spades.

Opener's next bids:

1NT Likely 5332 with 11/12 – 15 points

2 4/2 5/4 with 11/12-14/15 points

2 **♥** 11/12 – 17 points

2NT Balanced 18-19 points (may have spades)

With this uncertainty regarding spades, rebids by responder become complicated.

1 **v**-1 **∧**-1NT, rebids:

- 2♥ Doubleton heart, maybe 5-spades and minor shortness.
- 2 Weak hand, usually with 6+ spades (though it could be an exceptionally weak hand
- 2NT Invitational values, likely exactly 4 spades and 2 hearts.
- 3NT Game forcing values, likely exactly 4 spades and 2 hearts.
- 2m Natural and non-forcing,
- $3 \vee -3$ -card heart support, invitational values.
- Pass weak hand.

1 **v**-1 **∧**-2m:

- Pass A weak hand with 3/4-card support for the minor and likely a singleton or void in hearts
- 2♥ A weak hand heart doubleton heart doubleton
- 2 Shows 6 spades or better
- 2NT Balanced, invitational.
- 3m 4-card support for the minor with invitational values.
- 3SA: 6+ spades, invitational values
- The fourth suit at the cheapest level is Game forcing.

1 v -1 A - 2 v

- 2 A weak hand with 6-spades and a void in hearts
- 2NT Natural, invitational.
- 3m Natural and game forcing.
- 3♥ Invitational with 3-hearts.

Is there a better option? Yes $1 \lor -1 \land = 5 + \text{ spades}$ and 1NT denies 5-spades. Then the bids are:

5-spades NOT 4 (no alert required even if you play Flannery)

Opener responses

1NT=3/4-spades with 11-12 points

2**♣*** no fit 13-15

2 ♦ * no fit 16-17

2♥ - shows 6-hearts 11-21 points

2♠- shows 4+spades 11-21points

2NT* - shows no fit semi-balanced 18-19

1NT* 0-9 Semi-Forcing 2♣ 13+ with clubs

2♦ 13+ with diamonds

2♥ 8-10, 3 card support (constructive)

2NT* 13+ with 4 Trumps

3**♣*** 13+ with 3 trumps & 4+ clubs

 $3 \bullet *$ 13+ with 3 trumps & 4+ diamonds

3♥* 0-6 weak with 4+trumps

3♠*/4m* 13+ Splinters ` 3NT 13-15 2+ hearts

4M weak with 4+trumps
