
Counsel for the Defence 63 - Quiz



Q1: Do you agree with South's stated bidding?

Partner leads $K \clubsuit$, declarer winning her Ace. Then she tables the master trump felling partner's Queen.

Trick 1: partner leads K♠: K-2-3-A
Trick 2: declarer leads A♥: A-Q-7-3

Q2: What is the remaining trump position?

Now declarer plays a low spade to dummy's Queen, partner having played the 4 (standard count) - Trick 3: 2 + 2 - 4 - Q-?

Q3: What are your general thoughts about the defence at this point?


Q4: When at some point declarer plays dummy's 9, will you cover or not?

Post Mortem

Q5: What do you think of each player's decisions in the auction?

Q6: Do you agree with declarer's line of play?

Q7: How would our side have fared in a club contract?



Q1: Would you have bid at South's second turn, or passed as suggested?

Partner leads the $J\Phi$, which wins and continues with a second club which you win with the Ten

Trick 1: Partner leads J♠: J-3-6-8
Trick 2: Partner leads 7♠: 7-4-10-9

Q2: What is the remaining club position?

You continue with another club, declarer and partner discarding spades.

Trick 3: You lead A .: A .- 5 .- 4 .- 5 .

Q3: Your partnership are playing Standard Attitude discards - what do you make of Trick 3?


Q4: How do you continue the defence at this point?

Post Mortem

Q5: What do you think of West and North's bidding decisions?

Q6: What would you have led as North?

Q7: What would have happened if West had ruffed at Trick 3?



Q1: Why is best to play that partner's double in this sequence is for penalties?

Q2: What do you think West holds to justify his bidding actions?

Partner kicks off with 3 ♣, the first trick going 3 ♠: 3-5-8-A

Q3: What are the possible remaining club positions?

Q4: What are your thoughts about the spade position?

At Trick 2, declarer plays the $A \blacklozenge$, felling your Queen, and then continues with another trump, partner winning.

Trick 2: declarer leads A •: A-2-3-Q
Trick 3: declarer leads J •: J •- K •- 4 •- 5 •

Q5: Do you agree with the 5 • discard (standard attitude)?

Partner continues another club which declarer ruffs - Trick 4: partner leads $7 \div 7 \div 9 \div J \div 5$

Declarer continues with another top trump, discarding a club from dummy: Trick 5 - declarer leads 10♦: 10♦-6 ♦-10♣-4 ♣

At Trick 6, declarer leads a small spade, partner discarding: Trick 6 - declarer leads $3 \spadesuit: 3 \spadesuit - 6 \heartsuit - J \spadesuit - Q \spadesuit$

Q6: What are your general thoughts about the defence at this point and what do you lead to the next trick?

Q8: Could declarer have played better?
