Hand of the Month

A Slam Bidding Evaluation By Marc Goldberg

At a recent Unit 191 Championship game, North picked up a terrific hand. With 26 HCPs and all four aces, this could be the best hand North has ever seen. NS are not vulnerable, EW are vulnerable.

- ♠ AKQJ107
- **♥** AQ65
- **♦** A
- **♣** AQ

North likely has 4Φ in her own hand, even if partner is completely broke. Nine tricks cold, and the tenth could come from the opening lead or if partner has anything at all to contribute. North plans to open 2Φ and then show her outstanding spades.

North, however, is not the dealer. South deals and opens 2♥. This gives North a lot to think about.

What kind of hand would you expect your partners have to open 2♥ in first seat at favorable vulnerability? Would they have fewer than 6 hearts? Preempting with a 5-card suit may occur in some situations, but rarely on the opening bid. Would a 2♥ preempt guarantee the ♥K? Might they preempt with ♥JTxxxx or worse? Could they have fewer than 5 HCPs? What is your partnership's style on preempts? You might discuss this with your partners to understand how to proceed.

With a ten-card fit in hearts, that suit looks attractive for a game or slam. Could North explore a fit in spades? Would a bid of 2Φ be forcing in your system or not? And what would it mean? This is another topic to discuss with your partner.

In determining the best place to play, North should consider the number of tricks she might take in various contracts. Unless she is having an unlucky day where LHO has 6 spades to the 8, spades will yield 6 tricks. With a ten-card fit in hearts, the suit will yield 6 tricks if South's suit is headed by the ♥K and 5 sure tricks if the suit is headed by the ♥J. Plus, she has two tricks from the minor suit aces. Without the ♥K, 6♥ looks like the safest contract. No-trump could be at risk on a diamond lead where the ♦A is the only stopper. Opponents might run a lot of diamond tricks after they win the ♥K.

How can North find out if South has the ♥K? Bidding 2NT will not work for pairs who play that bid asks for a feature. Nor will it work well if the 2NT bid is Ogust, which asks partner to describe their hand and their suit. South will likely say they have a "poor" suit even if they have the ♥K. A bid of 4NT could work depending on partnership agreement. Some pairs play that, without a known fit (ie: both of the pairs have bid and agreed on a suit), 4NT is regular Blackwood- tell me how many aces you have. In this case, North already knows the answer, so the final contract would just be a guess. Some pairs play that 4NT is key card asking for the last bid suit. In this case, South would answer 5♠ showing one key card, the ♥K. That is all the

information that North needs. She now sees 6 spade tricks, 6 heart tricks, and two minor suit ace tricks- more than enough to bid 7NT. (Note: 4NT as key card asking works in this case. In other cases, 4NT as regular Blackwood without a known fit might be the winning tactic. This article is not suggesting that one method is superior to the other.)

Of the eight tables that played this board, three bid and made 7NT. One bid 6NT (made 7), two bid 6 (made 7), one bid 6 (made 7), and one bid 4 (made 7).

Fundamentally, making a bridge contract is about taking tricks. Evaluating your hand from a trick-taking standpoint can help you find the best contract for competing in duplicate bridge. Here is the full deal.
