He was able to rent the house at a favorable rate, because tourists would continually visit the site, sometimes shining their headlights on the house and sometimes even knocking on the door asking to see the house. Bridge Tips For Newer Players

- 1. A good lead is the top of a sequence; QJ10, etc.
- 2. Be aggressive in bidding games and conservative in bidding slams
- 3. If you are declarer playing in a suit contract, get the opponent's trump out.
- 4. Remember the bidding while you are playing.
- 5. Watch your opponent's discards and your partner's discards.

<u>Africa</u>

Patricia Skelton returned in early July from a two-week trip to Kenya and Tanzania. She said it was the best of the many trips she has taken:

Jambo, Jambo

I traveled to East Africa for my first Safari. I got to shoot lions; I used my camera. Actually, I used my iPhone 15pro and it took great pictures. My better half, Norman Phillibert, accompanied me after I drug him by his toe nails, He had a blast. This is officially my favorite vacation ever. We started in Nairobi, Kenya and loaded our suitcases into a Land Rover to spend 9 days doing safari's. We visited Masai Mara, Serengeti, and Amboseli. We traveled the whole time by the Land Rover and the stories about "African Massages" is very true.I recommend you fly between the reserves if possible. To describe the roughness of the ride, my iWatch registered over 20000 steps a day and I never left the vehicle.

This is a vacation to see Animals. Everyone wants to see the big five: Lions, Elephants, Buffalo, Leopards, and Rhinos. We saw lots of Lions: Males, Females, Maneaters, whole prides, etc. We saw lions sleeping, playing, "doing it", and we almost saw a kill. We saw even more elephants. They were my favorite. They were eating, playing, fighting, "doing it". We did have a close encounter with a male elephant that caused our guide to put the Land Rover in reverse and tell us to be quiet. Incidentally, we all got very, very quiet. We saw a few herds of buffalo. We only saw one Leopard in a tree. I only saw his legs and tail hanging down. I counted it. About the Rhino - I am sad to say I did not see any.

Beyond the big five, there are so many other interesting animals. The birds are fascinating: Crested Crowns, Ostrich, Secretary birds, Superbs, etc. I found this just as much fun as the big five. Giraffes, Topies, Wildebeest, warthogs, and more make great pictures as well. We saw Zebras migrating in the Serengeti of Tanzania, it must have been a dazzle of about 2000 or more. My recommendation is to remember to put down the camera and just enjoy all the animals, even the small ones.

Last, don't forget the people. There are 125 tribes in Kenya and only one still practices traditions: The Masai. There were several Masai men working at our camps and hotels. Norm kept asking them how many wives they have? Only one had 2 wives.

Make sure you learn a few words in Swahili. I do this every time I travel to a foreign country.

Jambo - Hello Asante - Thank you Hakuna Matata - No worries

I strongly recommend this vacation and Gate 1 did a wonderful job.

<u>Mongolia</u>

After returning from Algeria and Tunisia in May, George Sonnichsen and Carol Payette recently set out for a month long adventure to Mongolia, South Korea and Japan. Carol tells us: Starting from the US we flew to Seoul and on to Ulaanbataar, Mongolia, the coldest capital city in the world. From there we continued on to a remote camp in the southern Mongolian Gobi desert, where we slept three nights in a round, windowless ger with walls of felt made of sheep wool. These tents are used by the nomads. Fifty percent of Mongolians today still live in gers because they are easy to build, take down and move around, usually on camels, when their area becomes overly grazed. Large flocks of goats roam freely. Cashmere on the hoof. Herds of horses and sheep abound.

At one time, Genghis Khan founded the Mongolian Empire the largest contiguous land-empire in history. It stretched from Poland to Korea to Siberia and the Gulf of Oman and Vietnam, and consisted of 22% of the world's land mass. Bactrian camels, snow leopards and the endangered Przesalski horses call Mongolia home, and in prehistoric times, dinosaurs loved the 250 days of sun a year. The Gobi desert is the largest dinosaur fossil reservoir in the world.

The vastness and beauty of this special place leaves an indelible mark on our memories and souls...
