

Bridge Tips for Newer Players

- 1. My mother always said, "Diamonds belong on a woman's finger, not on the bridge table". If at all possible, don't bid 5D or 5C. If you can, bid 3NT or four of a major, even if the fit in the major is inferior to the minor suit fit.
- 2. If partner shows opening bid values and you have opening bid values, make sure your side reaches game. "He who knows goes". If your partner opens and you have game-going values, it is your responsibility to make sure you get to game.
- 3. Don't make ambiguous bids.

4. Another one of my Mother's rules... When you are on lead, there are three reasons for not leading your partner's suit: 1. you don't have any of his suit; 2. you've forgotten the bidding, or 3. you're looking for a new partner.

Trip Reports

Africa - Sara Godleski

Sara and Ray Godleski just returned from their 50th wedding anniversary trip. They went on a Natural Habitat Safari in Southern Africa. Sara tells us: The hardest part was the length of time it took to get to the starting point in Kasane, Botswana. Once the tour began it was quite the thrill! At our first day journey inside Chobe National Park, a leopard went right under Ray's seat sitting over the rear axle of our open air jeep. There is definitely no shortage of elephants as we saw about 2000, and maybe 500 hippos and another 500 antelope.

Our second part was staying on a houseboat in Lake Kariba, the largest man-made lake in the world. The third segment was at a luxury tent camp in Zimbabwe near the Kalahari desert. This time I had the thrill of a female lion going right underneath my seat. She was full of Cape Buffalo however so no threat to me. The only thing that scared me just a little was an adolescent elephant was about 10' away when he trumpeted with his trunk and flapped his ears at me. I wasn't sure if he was going to charge our jeep with me as his target.....apparently he was just trying to get a charge out of me....he succeeded!

We also saw many species of birds, a pack of wild dogs, a jackal, an ostrich, a herd of Cape buffalo, herd of wildebeest, several giraffes and zebras and prides of lion, and a couple of hyenas and baboons. About the only thing we didn't see was a cheetah or a rhino. The food was awesome and our guide was great, just one guide and 13 total guests. And we really enjoyed the happy hour sunsets. I highly recommend this trip.





AROUND THE WORLD – Dick and Mel Stieglitz

Dick and Mel Stieglitz recently travelled around the world by private jet, visiting ten countries on six continents in 26 days. The Boeing-757 plane itself was a destination with ultra first-class seating, a top-notch staff from Iceland Air, two chefs, and a sommelier. Once they cleared US airspace, the cockpit was open-door for the entire trip for passengers to visit with the captain and flight crew. We stayed at luxury hotels each night during the expedition.

Their special memories from the trip are: spectacular Four Seasons accommodations and Pad Thai cooking class in Chiang Mai, Thailand; cruising and sipping delicious port wine in the scenic Douro Valley near Porto, Portugal; and visiting the Grand Mosque and all-white marble Royal Opera House in Muscat, Oman.

The itinerary included short stays in hard-to-get-to places like the 2.5 mile wide Iguassu Falls on the border between Brazil and Argentina; Easter Island which is over 1,000 miles from the nearest other inhabited island in the Pacific; and Giza, Egypt where a National Geographic archeologist delivered an enlightening lecture literally between the feet of the Sphinx.

They also saw kangaroos, koala bears, and blue penguins in Melbourne, Australia; orangutangs and sun bears in Sandakan, Malaysia; and the "Big Five" (lions, elephants, leopards, rhinoceros and water buffalo) during a 3-day safari in Serengeti National Park, Tanzania.

Dick and Mel plan to do another around-the-world-by-jet trip in the near future with a new itinerary. Dick liked the trip so much that he has offered to be the sommelier on a future flight around the world!
