

As part of our continuing series of player profiles, we are pleased Dutch Dresser shared with us a look into his life, and recounted the adventurous trip he and his wife Elaine took in their sailboat.

DUTCH DRESSER

This month, we are happy to profile Dutch Dresser, one of our newer Directors.

Dutch and Elaine Dresser hail from the state of Maine, where Dutch served as Associate Head of School, Director of studies and a math and computer studies teacher at Gould Academy, a private boarding school in Bethel, Maine. In addition to being an educator, Dutch also had the habit of being on the cutting edge.

In the early 80's Dutch became interested in computer technology and led Gould through many computer network and technology advancements, such as hooking up to that new-fangled thing called the internet. Thanks to Dutch's ingenuity, Gould became the first independent school in the nation to be fully "wired" with every dorm room having a computer port for each resident. Along the way, he also helped many others, including the Federal Government, the State of Maine, and the local public school system, to implement significant technology improvements.

Life for the Dressers took and interesting turn in 2014-15, when they sailed their 42 foot sailboat Dawn an adventurous 7,000 miles in ten months, round-trip from Rockland, Maine to the Caribbean. Their voyage started with coastwise travel to Hampton, Virginia. They then sailed across 1400 miles of open North Atlantic to Virgin Gorda in the British Virgin Islands, and spent the winter wandering through the Caribbean. In the spring they returned through the British and US Virgin Islands, along the southern Puerto Rican coast before spending several wonderful weeks with friends and family in the Dominican Republic. The return to the US was via the Turks & Caicos, the Exumas, New Providence Island, and Grand Bahama Island.

Dutch says that his wife Elaine was the real hero of their Caribbean cruise. With only coastwise sailing experience, she left Maine as the only crew member on a 14-ton sailboat that would routinely sail day and night without sight of land. She stood regular watches AND provided gourmet fare for the Captain and the crew when they had friends aboard for their two longer passages. There were "full hot menus supplemented with bowls of fruit, candy bars, and snacks of all varieties. No weight will be lost on this junket," blogged Dutch.

There were both desirable and undesirable weather and sea conditions, as well as exhilaration as each destination approached. They did have some issues with mechanical failures of their refrigeration system and the autopilot which were eventually repaired. One of their friends quipped that cruising is "boat repair in exotic places."

As they traveled further south towards the Caribbean, the Dressers found one of the great pleasures of an ocean passage is the variety the sea surface can provide in color, shape, and size, and the truly remarkable sky, which changes its act each hour of every day, much to their delight. They truly enjoyed the adventures and sights they experienced on their trip, along with the joy of spending time with other cruising sailors.

Bridge Tips for Newer Players

- 1. Cover an honor with an honor.
- 2. Aces are to be used to take kings and queens. Don't lead unsupported aces.
- 3. Don't lead a singleton trump. It almost invariably finesses your partner.
- 4. With a two-way finesse, lead the Jack to tempt opponent to cover with the queen. If he doesn't, play high and finesse back the other way.
- 5. If you don't want the lead, don't win the trick.


